SIMS COMES TO KINGSTON Index to Classifications

Great American Admiral Who is a Staunch Friend of Great Britain.

Viliam Sowden Sims, retired Rear Admiral of the United States navy and the outstanding figure, of the American naval services during the war and for some years preceding it, is to visit Kingston Thursday night and Friday.

It has been his fortune to have more departmental storms rage around him than most sailor men, largely because he is of the type that isn't afraid of red tape and has cut through a lot of it in his day and reached his goal, and his goal was greater efficiency in the American

Canadian admirers of Sims are prone to credit all his fighting quaiities to the fact that he was born in Canada, that his mother was a Canadian girl and that the future admiral spent his early boyhood under the British flag. His father was Alfred Sims, an American engineer, who came to Port Hope in 1854, and there superintended the building of railway bridges on what is now the Midland division of the G.T.R. He wooed and won Louise Sowden, daughter of Edward Sowden, a pioneer settler from England, and a man of forceful character and local prominence. The admiral's father identified himself with the life of the town during his residence there and was an officer of the local Masonic lodge.

Always "Hopeless."

Alfred Sims moved to Toronto with his wife and two boys, and s year and a half was spent in that city. Then they went to Pennsylvania, and it was from there that "Bill" got an appointment to Annapolis Naval Academy at the age of seventeen, largely because his elder brother refused it. The admiral himself says that when he tried his preliminary examination the examiner, after a few questions, said: "You're absolutely hopeless," and hopeless Sims has continued to be when it came to red tape. He graduated from the academy in 1880.

It was on the China station where he first broke loose. He discovered that a British vessel, under Sir Percy Scott, could make 80 per cent. of hits and remembered that at Manilla the American navy scored 2 per cent. of hits only.

He was only a lieutenant, but felt it his duty to write to the Navy Department about the awful, inefficiency of the American gunnery.
