Death of Mrs. Calvin Spencer.
 Frederica May Kayler, wife of Calvin C. Spencer, died unexpectedly at Midland, Nov. 4th. Mrs. Spencer, up to the time of her marriage, had her home with her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Richard H. Hubbs, Picton. On June 1st, 1921, she was united in marriage with Calvin C. Spencer, son of C. Clapp Spencer, Picton, and went to Midland where Mr. Spencer is engaged in business. On October 27th, a daughter was born to them and mother and babe were progressing so favorably that the cause for anxiety appeared to have passed. The rupturing of a blood vessel was the cause of death and the rejoicing over the arrival of a daughter was suddenly turned to grief. Mrs. Spencer was a very popular young lady and the announcement of her death saddened a host of friends in Picton. The remains were brought to Picton for interment.

To Sell Part Of Property.
 Sealed proposals will be opened by the Superintendent of Lighthouses in Buffalo for the sale of a portion of the lighthouse property on Carleton Island, including a dwelling formerly occupied by the light keeper. For years a light has been located on the island. About five years ago, however, an automatic light was installed, making the services of a resident keeper unnecessary. The keeper of the breakwater light here has looked after the light on the island which is so arranged that it will light automatically as soon as darkness falls and then be extinguished with the arrival of daylight. The dwelling sets on Mile Tree Point, high up from the shore, and is well adapted for use as a summer home. The land includes about two acres. The lighthouse department will retain only a small strip on which the light stands.

Municipal Elections Go On.
 Many ratepayers of Smith's Falls supposed that when a by-election was announced to take place in Lanark county on Dec. 4th the council would rescind its by-law providing for municipal nominations on Nov. 27th and elections on Dec. 4th, but the council has decided to let the bylaw stand. Though municipal elections will come on the same day as the federal by-election, nominations for the former will not conflict with those of the latter. Municipal nominations are dated for Nov. 27th, while those for the by-election will take place on the 20th inst. It is now known that Dr. J. A. Anderson will be a majority candidate, and with this in view he has resigned from the Board of Education, as a member of which body he rendered the town excellent service for several years.

Broken at Gallipoli.
 John L. Murray, B.A., who a few days ago arrived in Kingston from Smyrna, where he was when the Turks captured that city from the Greeks, had occasion while teaching in the International College in Smyrna to converse with many Turks. From them he learned that it was at Gallipoli that the strength of the Turkish army was broken by the British and Australian forces early in the war. In the Gallipoli campaign the flower of the Turkish army fell, and at one time there was only a few thousand Turkish soldiers between that place and Constantinople. The inhabitants expected that the city would be captured and there was great scurrying to fill the depleted ranks. After that campaign the strength of the Turkish army was broken and it was a picnic for the British in Mesopotamia to clean up the Turkish irregulars.
