SHOULD REMOVE FALSE SIGNS FROM BUILDING

J. G. Evans' Building No Longer Headquarters of What Its Signs Tell.

The following facts have been brought to the attention of the Whig respecting the Kingston branch of the Navy League of Canada and an explanation is asked:

As late as Saturday the building on Princess street occupied by J. G. Evans as headquarters, or rendezvous, for a so-called veterans' organization of which he is head, presented the appearance of the headquarters of two universally recognized patriotic and imperial organizations, viz., the Army and Navy Veterans and the Navy League. On a window to the left of the main entrance are the words: "Army and Navy." "Navy League Branch No. 122." "The Naval Brigade." On ten windows of the third floor are the words: "Navy Brigade," and one one window: "Navy League Office." "Branch No. 122." Across the whole front of the building above the cornice are the words: "Army and Navy Veterans."

In February last the Navy League of Canada transferred the Kingston Naval Brigade to the guardianship of a new administration upon reorganization of the local committee. But the said J. G. Evans took no measures to remove from the windows the signs referred to, and the impression conveyed to the public that the Navy League was established there under his control was a false one and is still false. The same applies to the "Army and Navy Veterans."

At the Dominion convention of the Army and Navy Veterans Association held in Montreal in October, the J. G. Evans Kingston organization ceased to be a unit of the famous patriotic and imperial organization known the world over and held in the highest respect and esteem by His Majesty's soldiers and sailors. But J. G. Evans has not removed "Army and Navy Veterans" from the windows.

So let all of these signs of misrepresentation—be removed. "If a job is worth doing, it is worth doing well." Let the present rendezvous of a few ex-soldiers and some civilians be shown in its proper light, not as the headquarters of the Navy League and the local unit of Army and Navy Veterans. It is J. G. Evans' headquarters, with a canteen and billiard rooms as sources of revenue.

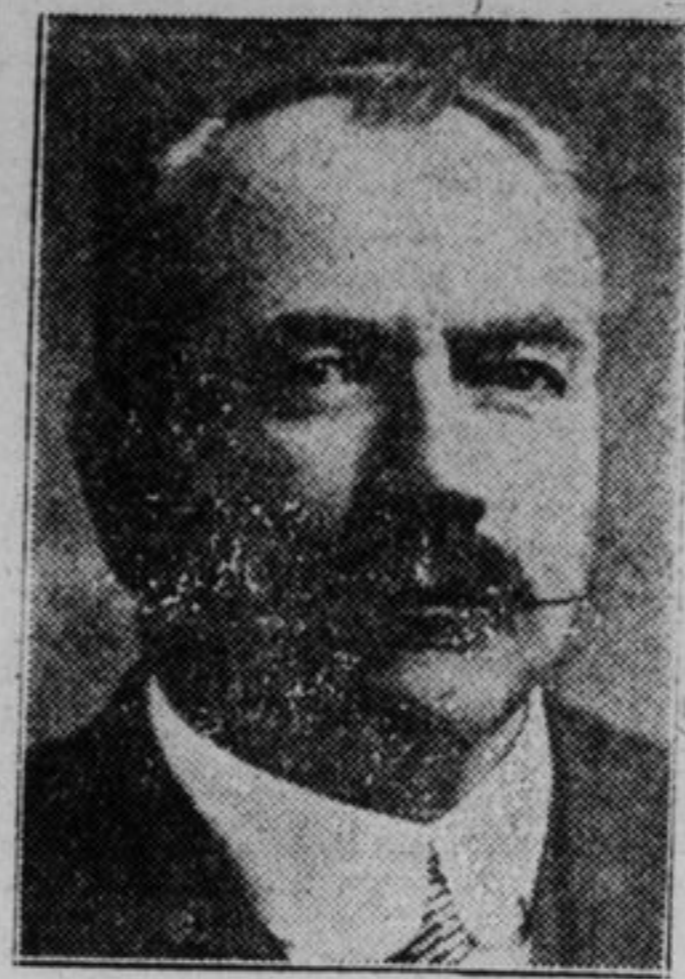
LATE KINCAID.

A Pioneer of the Caintown District Passes Away. Caintown, Nov. 17.—On Tuesday evening, Nov. 7th, there passed to rest one of the pioneer residents of Caintown, in the person of John Kincaid. The deceased had been in failing health for several months but was greatly blest in his last days, for suffering was absent except that caused by the weakness of advanced age.

The late John Kincaid was born July 1st, 1836, on the homestead where all his life he resided. He was a son of the late Robert Kincaid and Mary Rabb, who were pioneers, coming from the British Isles to settle in Canada in its early days. In 1868 he married Patience Earl, Temperance Lake, who survives him, with two daughters, Mrs. B. B. Graham, Caintown, and Mrs. W. H. Franklin, Junctown, also four grandchildren, Taylor and Everett Franklin, and Velma and Merrill Graham. One sister, Mrs. Isabel Tennant also survives.

In religion he was a Methodist and was very seldom absent from his home church until shut in with age. He filled for many years some of the various offices of the Church.

The funeral took place at Methodist Church, Caintown, on Thursday morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. T. Meredith officiating. The near relatives followed the deceased to his last resting place at Glen Elbe cemetery.

AN M. P. FINED \$200 FOR O.T.A. BREACH

Raney Deplores Fact That the Culprit Was Not Made to Appear in Court.

Toronto, Nov. 20.—In an official statement, Hon. W. E. Raney does not condone the practice of fining men for breach of the law without the culprit's appearance in court, an instance of which, involving a Dominion member of parliament for breach of the Ontario Temperance Act, was reported in a dispatch from Ottawa in the morning papers. That this system, if permitted, is liable to lead to grave irregularities was the substance of his comment.

According to the dispatch, to which Mr. Raney has reference, a member of the Dominion House was arrested Wednesday for breach of the O.T.A., and paid a fine of \$200 and costs to Police Court Clerk W. P. Letts, at Ottawa without appear-

ing before the magistrate.

Mr. Raney's statement follows: "The law is no respecter of persons. All summonses or warrants for appearance before magistrates for offences against dominion or provincial laws should be for appearance in open court. Any other practice, while it may be quite innocent in particular cases, is liable to lead to grave irregularities and will be certain to cause adverse comment on the administration of justice, which should not only be impartial in fact, but should also be free from any appearance or suggestion of partiality. Like Caesar's wife the courts must be above suspicion."

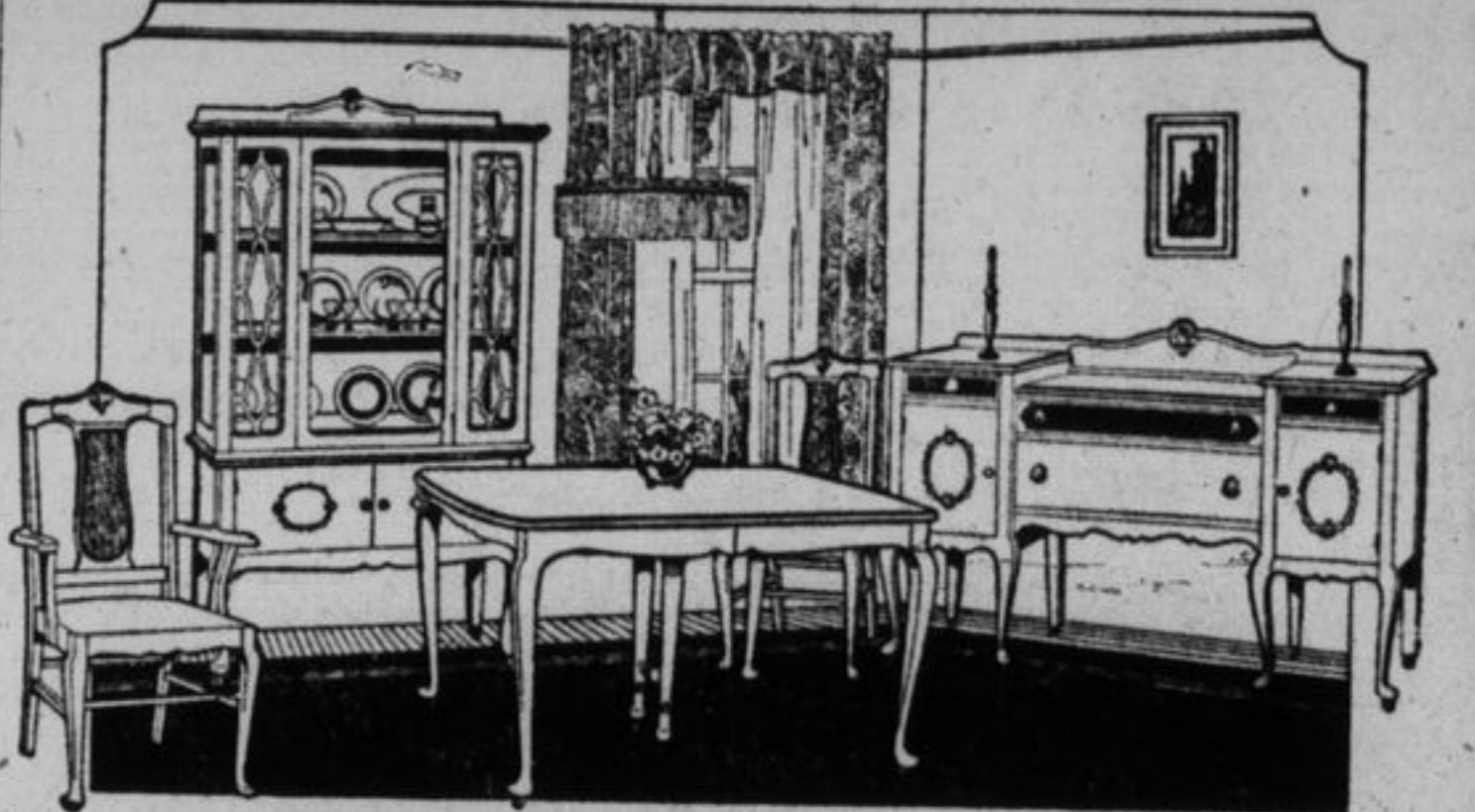
