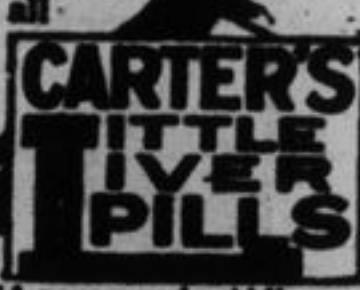

Changing Houses. Rev. Mr. Crawford of the Standard church, and his family, are moving into the Ed. Cannon house, Bloomfield. Mr. Cannon has moved to the Peter Burr farm, and Mr. Phillips into his own house on Stanley street.

Morrow-Casselman Wedding. At the Methodist church, personage, Brockville, Rev. G. W. McCall united in marriage Miss Grace Casselman, Brockville, to Robert Morrow, Caintown. The bridal party was attended by immediate relatives during the ceremony.

Tempted to Let Work Go. The agricultural representative of Leeds points out that a number of farmers are making from \$11 to \$15 per day teaming stone on the provincial roads and are tempted to let farm work slide while prices are so low for farm produce.

Good Returns of Coal. Coal is coming into the city in very gratifying quantities at the present time, and with the large consumption of wood, brought about by the strike, there should be little difficulty in obtaining enough fuel for the coming winter.

Cape Vincent: Man Takes Bride. Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Montanna, Cape Vincent, N.Y. have received cards announcing the marriage of their son, David L. Montanna to Miss Isabelle Lea Collins, San Francisco. The wedding took place on Oct. 23rd, in San Francisco.

Had A Critical Operation. Word was received by Mrs. Marshall Way, Pleasant Bay, that her sister-in-law, Mrs. Edgar R. Farrington, formerly of West Lake, and now of Battle Creek, Michigan, had undergone a very critical operation in the hospital there, and at time of writing is progressing favorably.

ice in time for despatch by the Christmas mail, payment of the order will not be made before Christmas.

Dies Suddenly in Mill. Stricken with heart failure while at work in the saw-mill of Earl Bolton at Portland a few days ago, Harry Ball, aged seventy-five, died very suddenly. Ball was hoisting a heading to another floor at the time and was alone. Dr. F. S. Young, coroner, Seeley's Bay, investigated and decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

To Manage New Hotel. Frank C. Moore, for the past year manager of the Hotel Woodruff, Watertown, N.Y., has tendered his resignation to take effect on January 1st next. Mr. Moore will devote his time to the proposed new \$800,000 hotel which is to be erected near Alexandria Bay and of which he is to become the manager. Mr. Moore has been one of the principal movers in the plan to erect a first class summer hotel in the Thousand Islands.

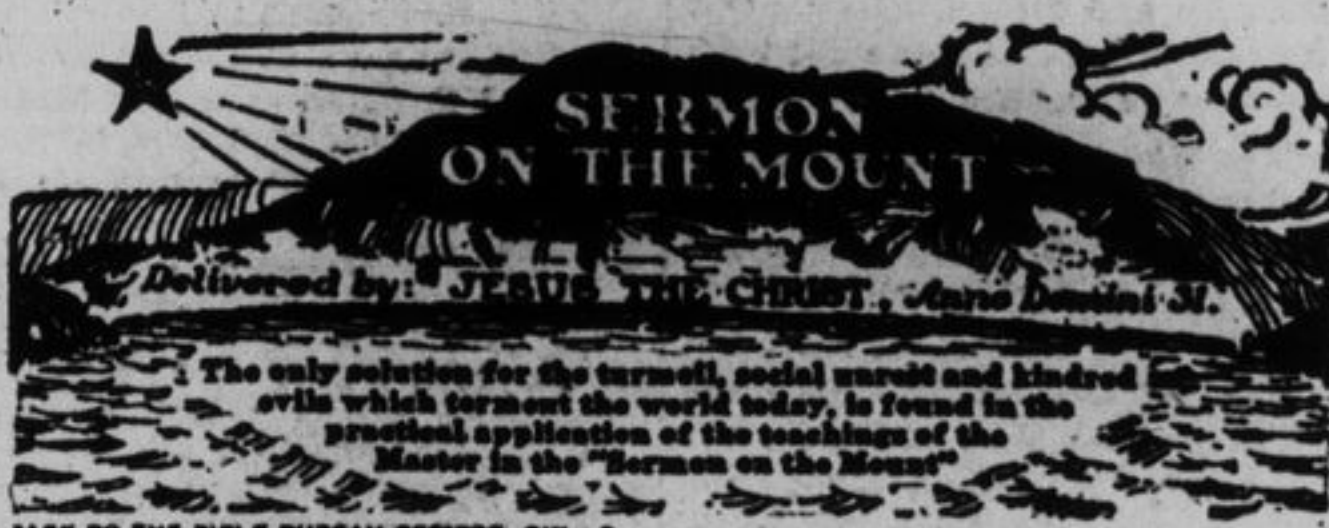

New Railway Bridge Soon.

The work of laying the new track for the Canadian Pacific and National Railway entrance to the city, and the piers for the overhead bridge have been finished by John Donovan, contractor. The steel structure has now to be placed upon the concrete piers and it is being built in sections which will be conveyed to the site and set in position. The span has been made long enough to permit of the addition of two more tracks on the G.T.R. road between the piers, so that the work may be regarded as a permanent job. There will be twenty-two feet six inches above the G.T.R. track providing plenty of space above the top of box cars. When the track has been laid on the bridge the C.P.R. and Canadian National trains will take the new line and the old diamond switch will be taken up and the track removed.
