## CLEMENCEAU INVADES

On His Campaign to Win America's Heart and Soul for France.

New York, Nov. 23 .- With United States senators denouncing him and a storm on the verge of breaking in congress because of his remarks. Georges Clemenceau invaded New England to-day on his campaign to win "America's heart and soul for France."

The eighty-one-year old French statesman left New York for Boston with no ceremony whatever. Newspapermen made up the "seeing off party." To the reporters, Clemenceau remarked excitedly, his voice shaking with emotion, that his trip here was "Splendid, splendid." The procession from the Gibson home to the station consisted of Clemencau's car and two taxi's carrying reporters. Accompanying Clemenceau were his valet and secretary.


