DIRECT EXCHANGE CANADA AND CHINA

Hon. Chas. Murphy and Chinese Director of Posts Sign Agreement.

Arrangements have been made between the Canadian Post Office Department and the Chinese postal administration for a direct exchange of money orders between Canada and China. The convention or agreement under which money orders are to be exchanged has been signed by Hon. Charles Murphy, the Canadian Postmaster General, and will go into effect on the 1st of January next.

In times past, the negotiation of such an agreement would have been regarded as a sufficient reason for the visit of a cabinet minister to China, but a new order of things now prevails, and business matters are transacted in the ordinary business way by the exchange of correspondence.

Hitherto, money orders payable in China have had to be issued on the British postal agencies at Hong Kong and Shanghai and some agencies of the Japanese postal administration, but under the new arrangement all orders issued in Canada payable in China will be reported on lists sent to the Chinese exchange office at Shanghai. The amount of each order will be converted into Chinese currency and a Chinese money order for the amount will be forwarded to the payee.

Orders issued in China for payment in Canada will be reported to the Exchange Office at Vancouver in dollars and cents. Canadian orders for the amounts in Canadian currency will be issued and forwarded from Vancouver to the payee.

Direct exchange of money orders with China has been contemplated for a considerable time, but action was deferred owing to the unstable rates of exchange that prevailed during the war and some time after. Moreover, there was little difficulty in forwarding money orders to China as long as the British postal agencies were in existence, as money could be forwarded through these offices.

According to the terms of the Washington convention held last year, these agencies are being withdrawn, and it becomes necessary that some arrangement should be made for direct exchange. Until the 1st of January, 1923, orders on the British office at Hong Kong which has agreed to act as intermediary until the new agreement goes into effect.

The closing session of the council was held on Saturday morning and the retiring warden, G. Melville Drew, delivered his valedictory. Warden Drew has proved himself one of the most efficient wardens of the province ever had. During the year he showed that he was a leader, and directed the affairs of the council with great credit to himself. He thanked the members of council for the support they had given him in connection with county matters, and hoped that they would be returned by their constituents at the January elections. Warden Drew would like to return to council himself, provided his constituents wish his further services. He wants to have something to say about the provincial highway bills at the January session.

NO CONTINUATION SCHOOL For Oso Until Pending Legislation on Secondary Education Is Announced.

At the county council session on Friday afternoon, the reports of the various committees were considered and all were adopted. The finance committee decided to lay over until the January session the account of the department of public highways for \$52,817.82. It decided that the department of public highways be paid \$3,077.09 for maintenance charge for 1919 and 1920 on the provincial highway. This amount, on recommendation of the good roads committee, will be charged against the townships in the good roads system and also the village of Portsmouth.

With regard to the diverting of the Collin's Bay road, as to abolish two dangerous railway crossings, the finance committee decided that the county solicitor be instructed to make application to the proper authorities for the granting to the county of a title to the land covered by water, which it will be necessary to use in constructing this piece of highway.

The joint committees on finance and education reported as follows with regard to application of ratepayers of Oso township that No. 9 school section of that municipality be set aside for the establishment of a continuation school; That this committee place itself on record as opposed to the request of the Oso petitioners but deems the time for action not opportune, on account of pending legislation covering the whole of secondary education in rural districts. This recommendation was adopted by council, on motion of Councillors Spankie and Hamilton.

The property committee commended the jailer and the turnkeys for the interest they have taken in the work of the jail department at the jail. It instructed the chairman to make arrangements to have the lighting system in the high court chamber improved, as the lighting has been reported by judge and grand jury as very unsatisfactory.

It was also recommended by the property committee that the sheriff request the inspector of prisons to allow the purchase of tobacco for prisoners engaged at tile work at the jail.

These contracts for fall supplies were awarded: Meat, Daniel Hogan; groceries, John Gilbert; bread, J. J. Laekie. The chairman of the property committee was instructed to procure tulip bulbs for the beds in front of the court house.

The council spent some time in revising the rules and regulations, something that had been referred to a committee for a report.
