Daring Voyages in Tiny Craft

The Duke of Leinster has announced his intention of crossing the Atlantic in a little twenty-five-ton yacht, accompanied only by a Scottish gillie, a man who knows nothing of the sea or of seamanship.

A risky game, no doubt, but, after all, his yacht is more than twice the size of Captain Joshua Slocum's craft, the Spray, in which he, single-handed, sailed round the world.

And the Spray, remember, was only an old oyster boat, about a century old, which Slocum rebuilt with his own hands. It is an interesting point that this bold mariner could not swim.

Far smaller craft than the Spray have successfully crossed from America to England. The record belongs to the two Norwegians who rowed across in the Fox, a tiny boat sixteen feet long, five wide, and drawing but four inches of water.

They left New York on the 6th of June, with provisions for sixty days, and proceeded safely until July 10th, when a heavy sea capsized the boat.

Yet they righted her; got aboard and baled her out. But they had lost all their provisions, their sea anchor and cooking utensils, and had they not met a passing ship, would have starved.

Sixty-two days after leaving New York, they arrived safely at Havre. The first crossing of the Atlantic in a small boat was made by Henry May, who was wrecked on the then uninhabited Bermuda Islands in 1533. He built himself a little boat out of the wood of his ship, and actually reached England safely.

The records for crossing the Atlantic in the smallest boat and in the quickest time belong to that wonderful mariner, Captain Andrews, known as "The Lonely Skipper."

Hearing that a man called Johnson had crossed in a twenty-foot boat, Andrews got one made on similar lines, but only sixteen feet in length. On his first trip he was accompanied by his brother, and they did the voyage in forty-five days, ending in Mullion Cove, Cornwall.

Later, the captain decided to try a single-handed voyage in an even smaller boat. This, which was named Sapollo, was a collapsible affair, only fourteen feet long, and five beam. He reached the Azores in thirty days, and thence safely made the coast of Spain.

His last boat in which Captain Andrews crossed was the Dove. She was but twelve feet long, and, when folded up, her crew was able to carry her under his arm.

Another most daring voyage was that of Captain Adolph Feltsch, in an open boat built entirely by himself, and called the Nina.

In 1895, Samuel Morse sent signals over an experimental telegraph wire, and a news message announcing the nomination of Henry Clay for President by the Whig convention at Baltimore was telegraphed from Annapolis to Washington, May 1st, 1844. However, the first regular telegraph message was sent May 27th of that year, when Prof. Morse at Washington opened a regular service by telegraphing to his assistant, Henry Rogers, at Baltimore, the following words: "What hath God wrought?" This message was suggested by a woman friend of the inventor. The first public message flashed over the line was the announcement of the nomination of James K. Polk for president of the United States.
