**Rex as "Grumpy."**  
 For the last three days of this week the Rex Stock Company returns to the production of one of those familiar old plays that have made such a hit in former years. A special committee was appointed by the Alma Mater Society to make a report on the loss sustained by the Grand Opera House.

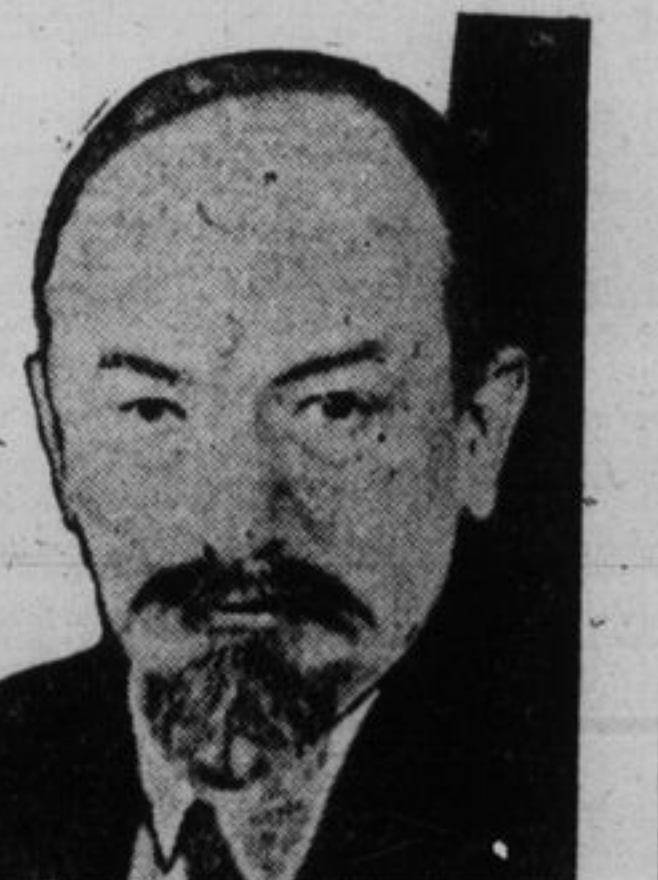
