#### STORE AND DWELLING ARE BURNED AT YARKER

The Loss Is \$3,000-Villagers Saved Other Buildings From Destruction.

Yarker, Dec. 6 .- The frame dwelling and store owned by J. T. Main, Yarker, was completely destroyed by fire this morning. The fire, which broke out at eight o'clock, was not extinguished until the buildings were fourned to the ground. The cause of the fire is unknown. The loss is \$3. 060. The frame structure was located a very short distance from the station of the Canadian National Railways. The station is on one side of the three railway tracks, while the Main property was on the

When the blaze was first noticed, a fire call was sounded with the result that dozens of villagers turned out and fought the fire with buckets of water. It was only a few minutes until it was seen that the building was doomed, so the fire fighters centred their attention, on saving the surrounding buildings. On a couple of occasions the roofs of the dwellings of Cyrus Edgar, W. J. Warner and Mr. Leonard, the station agent, caught fire, but the good work of the firefighters resulted in the blazebeing extinguished. There is no fire

Mr. Main has kept store in Yarker for a number of years, having erectthe new store and dwelling a few ears ago. He kept an ice cream parlor and candy store, and did a big business with people who passed through the village on the C.N.R.

HE DEFIED THE VILLAGE.

He Was Given Three Days to Quit Clayton, N.Y.

Thomas Longtin, well known moor boat operator, was banished from Clayton, N.Y., by decree of Justice of the Peace on Monday morning. Longtin issued a challenge to the village while he was intoxicated and Deputy Sheriff Rickett arrived on the scene in time to uphold Clayton's

It developed that Longtin had been out in the afternoon with Ambrose Bishop and Jim Cline and the three ate supper in Fowler's restaurant. Longtin alone was a cause of trouble. He was asked repeatedly to cease causing a disturbance. He went in front of the restaurant and hurled a defiance to the whole village. Bishop took up the cudgels for Clayton but was unable to withstand the blows of Longtin. Deputy Sheriff Rickett was called and Longtin resisted arrest. The officer

was forced to club him several times. On the way to the jail Longtin attempted to trip the officer, it was said. Four men were required to put the prisoner in the lockup. Monday morning he was arraigned and was sentenced to fifty-nine days in the county jail. This was suspended and the man was given three days to get out of town.
