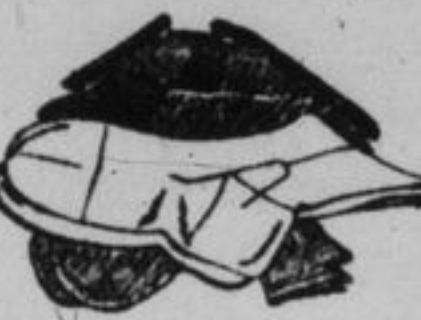

Managers of both companies declared they believed the bombs were thrown because of their refusal to join an organization to raise prices. The plants bombed were the Victory Laundry and the Angelus Laundry.
