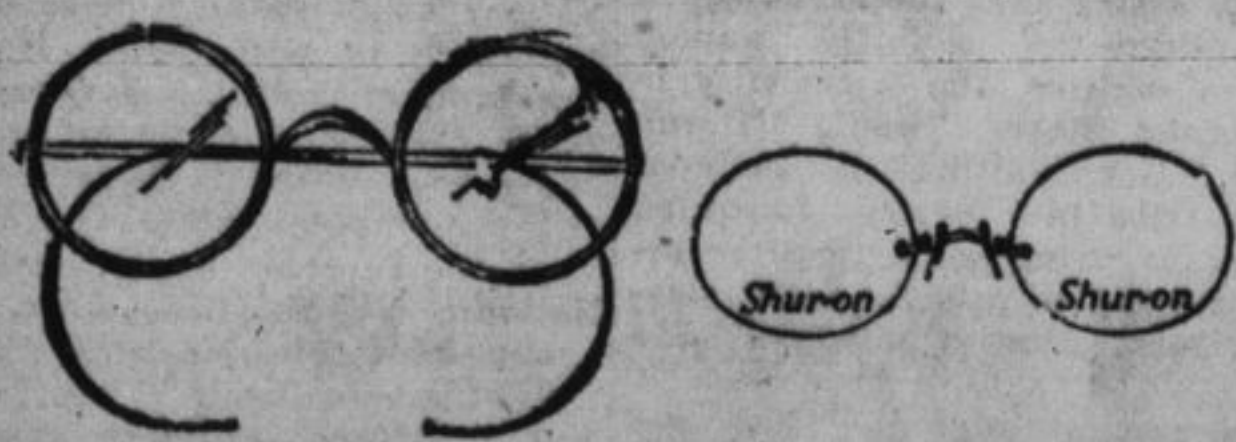

Fennox and Addington says: "Farmers are taking keen interest in the securing of pure bred Yorkshire pigs of the proper bacon type. Many have been making inquiries regarding the grading policy as outlined by the Live Stock Branch. Pure bred Yorkshire sows, five months of age, are selling at \$18 each."
