## LESS DRUNKENNESS AND "BOOTLEGGING"

**Reported by O.T.A. Inspector Gordon—Drunk Motorists the Great Menace.**

The provincial inspector for the O.T.A., J. W. Gordon, is in the city making his usual inspection of the local office. When interviewed, he stated that there was considerable activity in the local office during the past six months when the convictions numbered twenty-eight as compared with seven for the previous six months. Most of these convictions were for drunkenness.

Inspector Gordon is special O.T.A. inspector for the whole province and his territory is the Ottawa river. Replied to the question whether there was any lessening of the consumption in liquor, he stated that there were fewer convictions in the last year. Bootlegging has been killed off, he declared. There is not as much done in Windsor, since the United States began checking up importations and things are not now the same as they used to be. There was another feature to be reckoned with, however, and that was the large number of stills being seized. This is a form of liquor traffic very prevalent in the rural districts and the north country. It is nothing new for there was always more or less private distilling even in the days of the licensed sale of liquor. Thrifty people distilled their own whiskey because they could make it at a fraction of the cost for government bonded liquor.

"But I do observe that there is less drunkenness in public places; in fact it has almost disappeared, and there is a feature that emphasizes the importance of this. In the old times a man was seldom arrested for being drunk, indeed a policeman would often help such a man home, but today every person found staggering or drunk is promptly arrested and punished. Then again, take the automobilist. The first thing a police constable does now in the event of an accident is to smell the breath of the driver and the occupants of cars. Invariably it is found that one driver, if not both, was drinking previous to the accident or collision. A person with liquor when in charge of a car has not the necessary judgment of either with respect to speed or distances, and I am informed by motorists in the province of Quebec that it frequently happens that one has to take the ditch for safety and allow the whole highway to drunken fends travelling at high speed and away first to one side of the highway and then to the other. If we had not the prohibition law in Ontario, there would be more deaths on the streets of Toronto than we have now, large as they are."

**Hanged Himself in Jail.**  
Welland, Dec. 14.—Charles Beckett, charged with murder of Dwight Dills, at Pelham, two weeks ago, hanged himself in his cell, at Welland county jail, last night.
