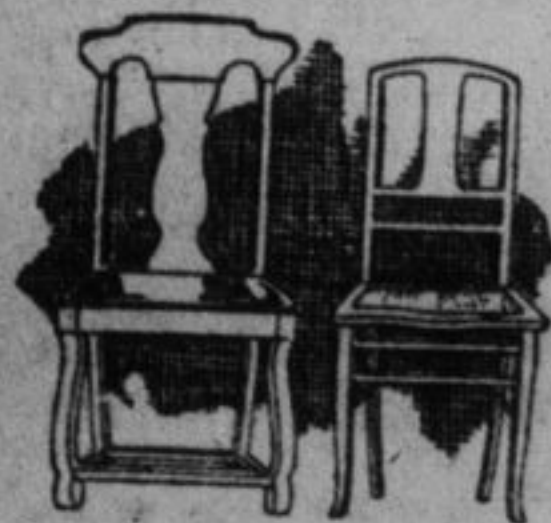

ANOTHER IMPROVEMENT FOR PRINCESS STREET

G. W. Lyons' New Store Further Aids the Appearance of Shopping Section.

People are passing favorable comment on the appearance of the new store of G. W. Lyons, Jeweller, at 244 Princess street, on the site formerly occupied by Sky's Community stores. In a very short time this place of business was fitted into an attractive jewellery store which is a fine addition to the array of beautiful stores on Kingston's main shopping street.

DR. A. P. KNIGHT OPPOSED

To Granting an Extension of Opening Season For Taking of Lobsters.

"The lobster industry of the Northumberland Straits would be ruined by granting the petition of the fishermen for an extension of the open season—permitting the taking of lobsters on Aug. 1st instead of Aug. 15th as at present." Such was the finding of Dr. A. P. Knight, chairman of the biological board of Canada, in his report to the department of fisheries.

Dr. Knight made an extensive investigation last summer at the request of the government, on the north shore of New Brunswick and the Prince Edward Island coast. He found that the female lobsters were carrying eggs which the animal would extrude in a few days or weeks if it were allowed to live. In his opinion they ought to be allowed to live and thus promote lobster propagation for the future benefit of the industry, but even under the existing regulations this cannot be done. Dr. Knight advocates the prohibition of all fishing from June 15th to Sept. 15th, and he believes that a rational appeal to the fishermen and canners of the maritime provinces during the next few years would result in the adoption of such a policy.

How vitally important this matter is may be judged from a consideration of the annual value of the lobster fisheries to the population of the coast. Last year the revenue derived was \$9,000,000, making the lobster the second important fish industry in Canada.

Dr. Knight shows that if the petition of the fishermen were granted, the female lobsters would be killed in thousands, every day after Aug. 1st because the eggs would not be attached to the tail of the mother but within her body. But whether within her body or without the result would be the same. August is the height of the egg-laying season for the portion of the straits covered, and the fishermen should petition the government to prevent all fishing until Sept. 15th in each year.
