To Pickle Sweet Peppers: Remove seeds from one dozen large, ripe, sweet peppers. 'Put one cup of pack them in sterilized glass jars, covering them with a pickling vinegar made of five cups of vinegar and two and one-half cups of sugar boiled together for a few minutes. Pour this sweet vinegar over the peppers while hot, and seal airtight at once."

G. A.: "Guest Cocoa: One-fourth cup of sugar, one-fourth cup of cocoa powder, one and one-half tablespoon of dry cornstarch, two cups of sweet milk, two cups of water, one teaspoon of vanilla and a pinch of salt. Mix cocoa, sugar, cornstarch, and water, and let this mixture boiling for ten minutes, stirring constantly. Then add the milk and cook one-half hour over hot water. Add the vanilla and salt and beat hard with an egg beater."


