ABUNDANCE

Price For Best Fifty Cents a Pound-People Unwilling to Pay This.

There was abundance of turkeys on the market on Thursday morning. Some farmers stated that turkeys were not selling as well as on previous years. Several who brought some nice birds to the market on Saturday and Tuesday last took them home again because they would not accept the price that Kingston people were willing to pay.

On Thursday morning, a local retail dealer when asked the reason for there being so many turkeys, stated that he thought the Argentina turkeys, which were being brought into the larger centres, had resulted in great quantities of the local turkeys not being shipped to Montreal and Toronto. When asked as to the quality of the birds which were being imported he stated that they were not the kind of turkeys that Kingstonians were used to .. In most cases they are thin and have been frozen, which does not add to the eating qualities of turkey.

It is understood that there is not an imported turkey in Kingston, for no other reason that Kingstonians would not buy second rate stuff.

The retail prices for turkeys in Kingston on Thursday were from 40 to 50 cents a pound according to size and quality. Small hen turkeys are in demand and dealers are asking fifty cents a pound for them. Times have changed, and people who years ago would buy very large was keys, are now looking for the small-

In Toronto turkeys are selling at 40 cents a pound, ducks 32 cents, chickens and geese 30 cent.
