Ever since the close of the war there has been a steady reduction of business undertaken on behalf of the government, and holdings of dominion and provincial government securities are down to \$22,950,224, 2 reduction of over \$1,500,000. Canadian municipal securities total \$7,-901,027; railway and other bonds, debentures and stocks \$13,462,068, and call loans not exceeding thirty days \$48,610,100.


