Red and white, the colors of R.M.C., and the Union Jack, under whose cross-barred banner the graduates of the Royal Military College have fought in many lands, decked the corridors and auditorium of Sir Arthur Currie Hall on Thursday evening for the annual Christmas dance given by the Commandant, staff and Gentlemen cadets of the College.

At the head of the stairway, the Commandant, Major General Macdonell, K.C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., and Lady Macdonell received the throngs of guests, the latter wearing a handsome gown of amethyst brocade and silver, and carrying crimson roses. The spirit of Christmas jollity was in the air; perhaps the youthful enthusiasm of the school girls home for the holidays, who consider this a Christmas party arranged for their benefit, was infectious, for other people danced gaily to the excellent music of Trencor's orchestra and applauded the dances as heartily as their sons and daughters. Silhouettes of cadets in their numerous avocations were in the windows, the work of the artists among the boys of Point Frederick; red and white balloons, the latter with a flag of "Xmas Dance 1922", for decoration, were strung from gallery to gallery across the head of the dancers, to fall later and be carried home as souvenirs.

On a football, significant for the fact that R.M.C. won the Intermediate Collegiate championship, told the dance numbers through a slit in the pignose and above the platform "Truth, Duty, Valor" and the College arms, blazed forth in colored electric lights. Beautiful effects were achieved with lights which flashed starlike or flew hither and thither among the dancers and the scarlet mess jackets of the staff, the red tunics of the cadets, the flashing jewels, silver and gold cloth or sequined gowns, made a colorful scene indeed. Supper was served in the mess rooms and this dance went gaily on for several hours.

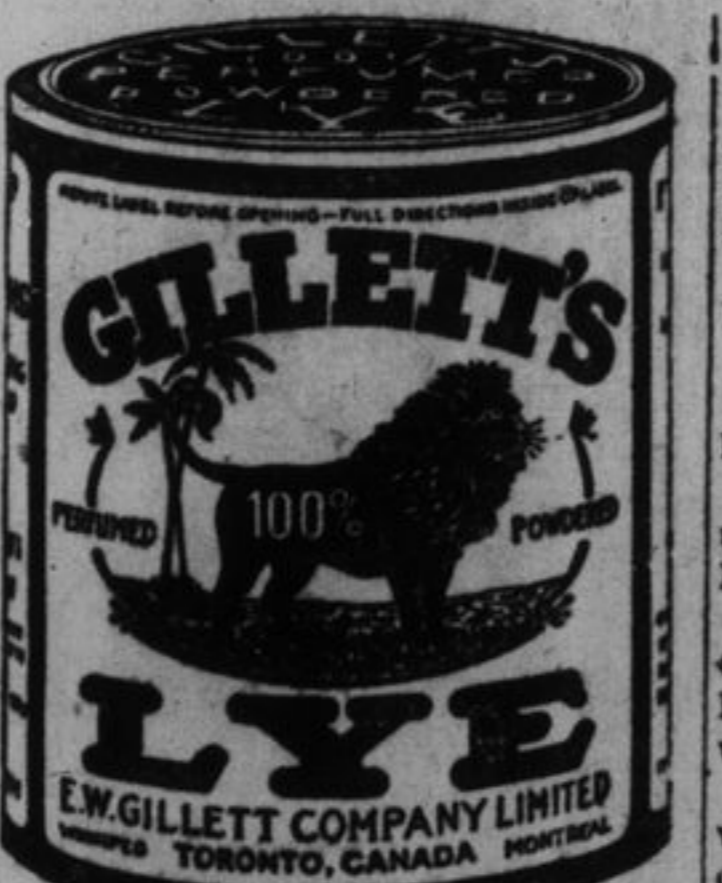

Efficient Housekeeping by Laura A. Kirkman. Recipes for Christmas Cakes. Some time ago some of my Reader Friends were kind enough to send me recipes for Springerle cookies, or Christmas Cakes, which other readers will find very useful at this time. Mrs. F. G.: "I enclose a recipe for Springerle Cookies, also one for Pepper Nuts: Sprinkle No. 1: Cream together one tablespoon of butter and two cups of pulverized sugar; add two unbeaten eggs, one at a time, beating well. Add four cups of flour which has been sifted with one-fourth teaspoon of soda. Sprinkle anise seed on your bread board and on these roll the dough one-fourth inch thick. Now stamp with regular Springerle blocks or forms (these are of wood and have stars, figures, flowers, houses, trees, etc., carved on them), then cut the small square pictures apart. Let them stand in a cool place overnight, and in the morning transfer them to a baking pan and bake in a moderate oven for about 15 to 20 minutes—until just a very light brown. Store in a dry place. Pepper Nuts: Beat together for one hour 1 pound of pulverized sugar and four eggs, stirring only one way. Then stir in one-half teaspoon each of salt and baking powder, one teaspoon each of ground cloves and cinnamon, one cup of chopped almonds, a small piece of citron finely shaved and the grated rind of one lemon. Let stand for one hour, then drop on a baking pan. Bake in a moderate oven for 20 minutes." A. M., H.: "Springerle: Mix together in a bowl one pound of powdered sugar, butter size of a small nut and four eggs well beaten; beat this batter for 15 minutes, then add one tablespoon of anise seed, one-fourth teaspoon of soda and work in
