Belleville Hydro Profit. Profits from the retail of electric power in Belleville from the time the Central Ontario system was taken over by the Hydro in March, 1916, up to the end of the year 1921 have been \$115,142, and this with the profits from Trenton, Port Hope and Oshawa has gone to meet deficits in other plants. This has been brought out in a report by W. B. Bonthron of the firm of Price, Waterhouse & Co., accountants for the Gregory Commission. In Kingston the loss is given as about \$3,500.
