



Brush-Turkey Nests.

"The Brush-Turkeys belong to the eighth family of game birds, Teddy, and their swell name is 'Talegallus.' These birds are brown or black and have wattled skin on their head or neck, which give them some sort of resemblance to a turkey, although is not very strong. I forgot to tell you that their family name was 'Magapode,' but I do not suppose you care very much. Sometimes these mounds they make for nests are fifteen feet high and sixty feet in circumference and the eggs are five feet down, but they are generally smaller. You will find them, Teddy, under deep foliage as a general rule, protected from the sun. Close to the water they are made of sand and shell, but further away they are formed of leaf mould and light soil I tell you this because the material of the nest makes the eggs a different color. Those in the mould nest are dark-reddish-brown, while those in the sand are dirty yellowish-white. The hen lays an egg at night, I think, and then does not lay another for several days.
