Nurses Registration. The legislation of last session which provided for the registration of nurses in Ontario became operative today. This simply means that each graduate nurse fills in an application form, signed by the superintendent of her school, pays a small fee, and when her claims are investigated and verified, she may hold the distinctive title "Registered Nurse." Any persons posing as such without having properly qualified are made liable to a fine of \$100. This form of registration is the one used in every state of the United States.
