PULPIT HITS OUT AT VICE

Montreal Methodist Clergy- men Demand Drastic Reforms

SMALL CHANCE OF PROBE

As the French Think It Is An English Attack Upon Them.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—General denunciation of Dr. Haywood's charges, coupled with strong criticism of the government's liquor policy, was pronounced from several pulpits in local Methodist churches last night. Every phase of vice was dealt with and demands for immediate and drastic reform were voiced.

Speaking of "Montreal's Vice Problem," Rev. Dr. E. I. Hart, preaching in Sherbrooke street Methodist church, warned to his subject and suggested eight remedies which he considered essential to a genuine cleanup of vice.

Rev. A. E. Rinnell, who spoke in Fairmont Methodist church on "Vice and Gambling in Montreal," to a congregation which completely filled the church, denounced the provincial government, declaring that "as long as the government sees fit to reap its revenue from such sowing, we must expect this kind of degenerating conditions in Montreal."

Rev. H. Burnette, of Mountain street Methodist church, also warned emphatically over his subject, "The Recent Vice Exposure in Montreal." Among the suggestions which Mr. Burnette put forward was that not a single public dance hall in Montreal should be allowed to operate without the presence of a police matron. He also firmly denounced the "low theatres of the burlesque character, which undoubtedly have a very bad effect on the morals of young men."

Small Chances of Probe.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—The vice situation is due for an airing in the city council meeting this afternoon, but it is an open question as to how much the curtain will be drawn aside. Two of the aldermen have stated they will ask for an investigation of the charges of protection made a week ago by Dr. A. K. Haywood, superintendent of the General Hospital, which by the way, despite the fact that it is one of the largest institutions of its kind in Canada, is situated right in the heart of the red light district. Whether these two will get a sufficient following to start an investigation is doubtful, as most of the aldermen have so far shown no disposition to take off the lid. Undoubtedly they are being influenced by the fact that so far none of the French papers and none of the Catholic clergy have shown any interest in the matter. Father Gauthier, pastor of a church in the "district" is on the committee of sixteen, but he reported directly to Bishop Gauthier, and so far every effort to get a statement from his grace has failed. Some of the aldermen are also making capital out of the fact that Dr. Haywood is from Toronto only four years ago and they are disposed to take the attitude that this is another attack on the French being made by the English and Protestant section of the city. Accordingly the chances of a probe do not look any too serene.



The Late Miss Annie E. Thompson.
Miss Annie Eliza Thompson, aged sixty-three years, passed away at her late home, in Inverary, on Saturday afternoon, January 13th, after a long illness. Deceased was born in Inverary and has resided there all her life. She will be missed by a large circle of friends as her charitable disposition was well-known throughout the community. She was a Methodist in religion and an ardent church-worker.

Late Charles H. Clark.
Charles Henry Clark, eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Perrigan Clark, died at his residence, 86 Pine street, on Saturday night about 9.30 o'clock after an extended illness. He was born in Ernestown in 1845. His wife, Sarah Bateson, predeceased him about four years ago. The late Mr. Clark is survived by four children: Mrs. A. G. Godwin, Long Beach, California; R. J. Clark, Kingston; Matthew Clark, Vancouver, B.C.; and Miss Jessie, at home. The deceased was a Methodist in religion, being one of the older members of Brock street church, and latterly of Queen street church.
