THE TRADES AND LABOR LEGISLATIVE PROGRAMME

Recommendations Made to the Government by Deputation Headed by Tom Moore.

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—Headed by Tom Moore, president, representatives of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada yesterday afternoon made their annual "pilgrimage" to the Cabinet and presented their legislative programme.

To meet unemployment the delegation urged the carrying on of all public works and the purchase of supplies during the periods of depression; control of private industry to prevent undue flooding of the labor market by outside labor and to prevent the laying off of men until the hours of all employed in the industry had been materially reduced.

The delegation asked for repeal of the 1919 amendments to the Immigration Act, making British-born citizens "liable to arbitrary deportation." They asked that all labor secured outside Canada be included amongst prohibited classes unless secured through the employment service of Canada.

Total exclusion of Orientals was one of the demands of the delegation.

The delegation advocated abolition of the sales tax, criminal code amendments to re-establish the right of peaceful picketing; amendments to the Industrial Disputes Investigation Act; support of the League of Nations, and international labor organizations; proportional representation; abolition of forfeiture of election deposits, and repeal of 1920 amendments to the Franchise Act prohibiting trades unions and other organizations contributing to election campaign funds.

HED HUGE FORTUNE

Securities Worth \$8,000,000 Found in Vault in London Bank

New York, Jan. 23.—In the vault of a London bank \$8,000,000 worth of sound securities which the late Jacques Lebaudy, the "Emperor of the Sahara," concealed during one of his eccentric spells, and which had not since been heard of, has been discovered, according to private advices received in Brooklyn by lawyers connected with the settlement of the estate.

The securities were placed in the bank for safe-keeping by Lebaudy under an assumed name. His death at the hands of his wife in their Westbury (L.I.) home January 11, 1919, cut off all information regarding the secret fortunes.

CASTLE ON THE RHINE EQUIPPED FOR \$1,000

Some Very Rare Bargains Are Offered These Days in Germany.

Coblenz, Jan. 23.—A fine 50-room castle on the Rhine opposite Coblenz, together with its furnishings and 15 acres of vineyards is advertised for sale for \$1,000. F. Mochau, of Chicago, an army official, who will depart with the U.S. troops has just bought his wife's father, for \$65, a farewell present of an apartment house at Mayence consisting of six three-room apartments and a plot of land. There were two pre-war mortgages on the house for 43,000 marks or the old equivalent of \$10,000. Mochau paid off the mortgage for \$2, the present equivalent of 43,000 marks. An American army officer a year ago ordered a hunting rifle, then valued at \$100. Yesterday the rifle was delivered to him and he paid the mark equivalent for it, or 30 cents in American money.

REV. DR. STRATON'S CRITICISMS.

Dr. Grant, Coue and Satan Are Attacked.

New York, Jan. 23.—Rev. Dr. John Roach Straton, pastor of Calvary Baptist church, featured his sermon Sunday morning with an attack on Dr. Percy Stickney Grant, M. Emile Coue and the devil.

After expressing intense disapproval of the "crizes" which sweep the country, distracting the people from the proper thought of God and salvation, Dr. Straton severely criticized Coue.

"Now comes Dr. Coue," he said, "and through the astute manipulations of a highly efficient press agency, a plain, dapper, little chemist with a face which reminds one of a good natured opossum, becomes the sensation of the hour. Millions of dollars of valuable space in our great papers is devoted to him and his catchwords, and the easily gullible American public once more shell out their shekels and wisely wag their heads, as they discuss with each other whether perchance, the millennium through M. Coue's manipulation, may not be near at hand.

"Dr. Coue would have us exalt the imagination to the supreme place, instead of the will. He would have us deluge ourselves. I think I can say 'Every day, in every way, we are getting sillier and sillier.'"

About Dr. Grant, the Rev. Straton said:

"The rector of one of our greatest Episcopalian churches has stepped now into the limelight beside that Baptist preacher who recently made his bid for fame by denying the virgin birth, the inspiration of the Bible and the second coming of the Lord. This latest exponent of religious radicalism and clumsily camouflaged infidelity is even more outspoken. The bad ethics of this thing is what most impresses me."

Claim Teacher Incompetent; High School Pupils Strike

Saskatoon, Jan. 23.—As a protest against what they term the incompetence of their teacher, thirty Blain Lake high school students are out on strike this week. They have refused the invitations of both the school board and the teacher himself to return.

Before they struck, the students held an indignation meeting, at which a committee of four was appointed to interview the trustees. No action resulted from their discussions and the walkout followed.

Heat Became Intense, Tracks Doubled Up

Belleville, Jan. 23.—From some cause a tank car loaded with gasoline caught fire and exploded Sunday on the line of the C.P.R. near Shannonville.

The railway employees, after considerable difficulty, separated the car from the remainder of the train. The tank car was a complete wreck. So intense was the heat that four lengths of the track were doubled up and wires melted from all adjoining telegraph poles.

Cheap Publicity.

Editor and Publisher, New York. The cheapest and at the same time the most valuable thing in America is newspaper advertising. Expert tells us that the value of what the United States produces annually is \$40,000,000,000 and of this amount \$500,000,000 is spent for advertising. In other words, 2 per cent. of the total goes into advertising and of the total of \$500,000,000 more than \$400,000,000 goes into newspaper advertising.

An unusual example of the power of the printed word was finished recently by the San Francisco Chronicle. Two days before Christmas that newspaper published an editorial appeal asking its readers to stop their contributions to the Wounded Soldiers' Christmas Fund that had been conducted by that newspaper. The fund had been over-subscribed.

The merit of the thing advertised was unquestioned and the result was overwhelming public response.

Centenarian is Dead
Pembroke, Jan. 23.—Over across the Ottawa River in Shawville, Que., there died last week, after a brief illness, the oldest woman in that section of the county. Rebekah Hodgins, relict of the late Thomas Hodgins, was 100 years old last August, and up to a few days of her death was apparently in as good health as ever. She is survived by seven daughters and two sons.

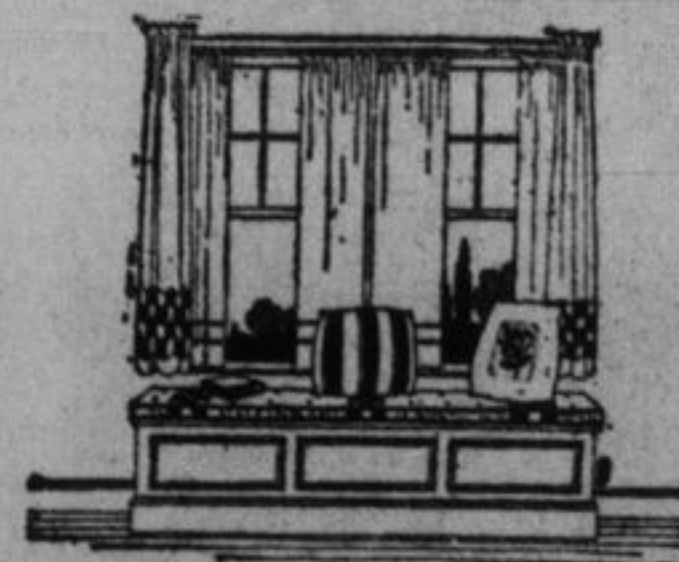
