Sabotage Against French Occupation Continues in Ruhr.

## FRENCH HOPE TO BE ABLE

## Berlin By the 31st of January.

London, Jan. 29 .- The entire occupied Rhineland to-day lent its weight to sabotage against French occupation of the Ruhr. While the latter district was almost completely. cut off from the outside world by telephone, telegraph, waterways and railway strikes, walkouts by German gailworkers spread to Cologne, Treves, Aix la Chapelle and Coblenz. Dusseldorf was temporarily isolated by a strike of communications last night. Central offices of the telephone and telegraph exchanges were closed.

The rail strikes in the Rhineland were aimed particularly at the great international expresses which pass through the occupied zone. French sources reported an attempt to wreck the Paris-Warsaw express outside of Aix la Chapelle. Rails were loosened but were mended by French workers, it was reported from Paris.

News from the interior of Ruhr was meagre. Apparently a strike censorship, combined with sporadic telephone and telegraph strikes, made trnasmission of despatches next to impossible.

French forces wlong the Rhine and in the Ruhr were working to combat the German sabotage. The occupation is expected to have reached a stage by Wednesday where France will feel able to present an to Berlin, demanding payment of 25,000,000 pounds sterling due Jan. 31st.

French Expe'ling Strike Officials Dusseldorf, Jan. 29 .- French occupation authorities to-day began series of wholesale arrests and expulsions of the highest German state officials, chiefs of bureaus and municipal heads of services for rofusal to obey orders.

The strike of the German raffroad workers throughout Ruhr was complete today as was that of the telegraph employees. Telephone and postal services are partially affected.

# RUSSIA TO GIVE

Belgrade, Jan. 29 .- The government newspaper, Tribunal, says that Foreign Minister T. Chitcherin of Russia and Ismet Pasha have made a secret agreement by which Turkey and Russia will give each other military support in the Near East in case hostilities are resumed. The agreement stipulates that Russia will send several divisions into Mesopotamia should the British and Turks take up arms.

Dublin, Jan. 29 .- Blazing madl trains, fired by insurgent incendiaries, were sent, one after another, lin line at Enniscorthw as part of a great rebel activity that developed over the week-end. Attacks Sunday on Governor-General Healey's residence were part of the demonstration against the Free State.

The Dublin mail was held up in County Wexford and set afire, after which the attackers tore up rails at the foot of a decline and sent the train down to destruction. Two other trains were captured and sent hurling down into the blazing wreckage. In one instance, where there was a double line, an engine jumped a break in the rails and the fire department of that city, and continued on its way for eighteen ville to be comparatively free from miles before stopping. The only casualty was a Free State officer, badly beaten by rebels.
