WAVES CRUTCH AT THE KING

Crippled Soldier Causes a Sensation At St Pancross Station, London.

London, Jan. 29.—What is described by the Evening News as an attempt to assault King George, was made to-day by a crippled ex-soldier when King George and Queen Mary arrived at St. Pancross station from Sandringham this morning. The newspaper says the soldier, who had been hiding, dashed towards the royal couple waving his crutch threateningly, and had got within a few yards of the king when he was stopped by the police. Other accounts by news agencies described the incident merely as an attempt of the soldier to attract the king's attention, and the soldier himself placed this construction on the affair.

SUPREME GRAND MASTER OF KNIGHTS TEMPLAR

Visited Kingston Saturday, Accompanied by Other High Officers of Order.

Supreme Grand Master, Dr. A. S. Estey, Calgary, Alta., was the guest of the Hugh de Payens Preceptory, Kingston, on Saturday last and the occasion was marked by a large attendance of the local knights. The supreme grand master was accompanied by the Deputy Grand Master, E. A. Evans, Quebec, the grand chancellor, W. H. Eckhardt, Montreal, and the provincial grand prior of the Kingston-Ottawa district, John Gray, Ottawa. The distinguished visitors reached the city by the noon train on Saturday and were met by Sir Knight W. A. Bearance, local preceptor, W. Y. Mills, J. S. Singleton and V. Bryant. They were shown many places of interest in Kingston, and in the evening were tendered a dinner at the Frontenac club. While in the city they stopped at the Chateau Belvedere. Dr. Estey was elected to the office of Supreme Grand Master at the meeting of the Sovereign Grand Priory held in Kingston in 1921, and he is now making official visits to the principal centres, including Belleville, Hamilton, Toronto, London and Ottawa.

SEWER IS AGAIN HELD UP

One Member of Allen Estate Will Not Give the City Permission.

The commencement of work on the trunk sewer, which it was expected would give employment to about fifty men, got another setback on Saturday when it was learned that a member of the Allen estate would not permit the sewer to be built on the property. At the last meeting of the Board of Works, assurance was given that the work would commence on Monday. On Saturday, when everything had been gotten ready to start on Monday morning, the city engineer was informed that the work would have to be postponed. It is understood that one member of the Allen estate objects to the sewer being constructed and for that reason work will have to be held up until things are adjusted. The delay is unfortunate as there are so many men in need of work, and the building of this sewer would assist them.

On Monday morning a gang of about fifteen men were selected by the local representative of the Ontario government labor employment bureau and sent out to the Kingston ice house. Ice cutting was due to commence on Monday morning and will continue for about four or five weeks. A number of local butchers commenced cutting ice on Monday morning.

The Late Herbert Rea.
The funeral of the late Herbert Rea took place from his father's residence, David Rea, 60 Bay street, on Saturday afternoon under the direction of John Cornelius, to Cataraqui cemetery. Rev. W. E. Kidd conducted the service. There were many beautiful floral tributes, including some from various sports organizations in the city, and the funeral was attended by many young men friends of the deceased who had been formerly prominent in local sporting circles. The pall-bearers were Elwood Nicholson, Frank Sands, Robert Irwin, Howard Kirkwood and W. Steen, all boyhood friends of the deceased.

Frontenac Fishermen's Association.
A meeting of the Frontenac Fishermen's Association was held in the agricultural hall on Saturday when the members met A. Rankin, M.P.P., to discuss various features of legislation governing the fishery business in its commercial aspects. Last year, through the efforts of Mr. Rankin, some of the restrictions were removed as a result of the formation of a Frontenac association, and as these are important matters arising that affect the fishermen, the organization is able to place them before the government in an effective way.
