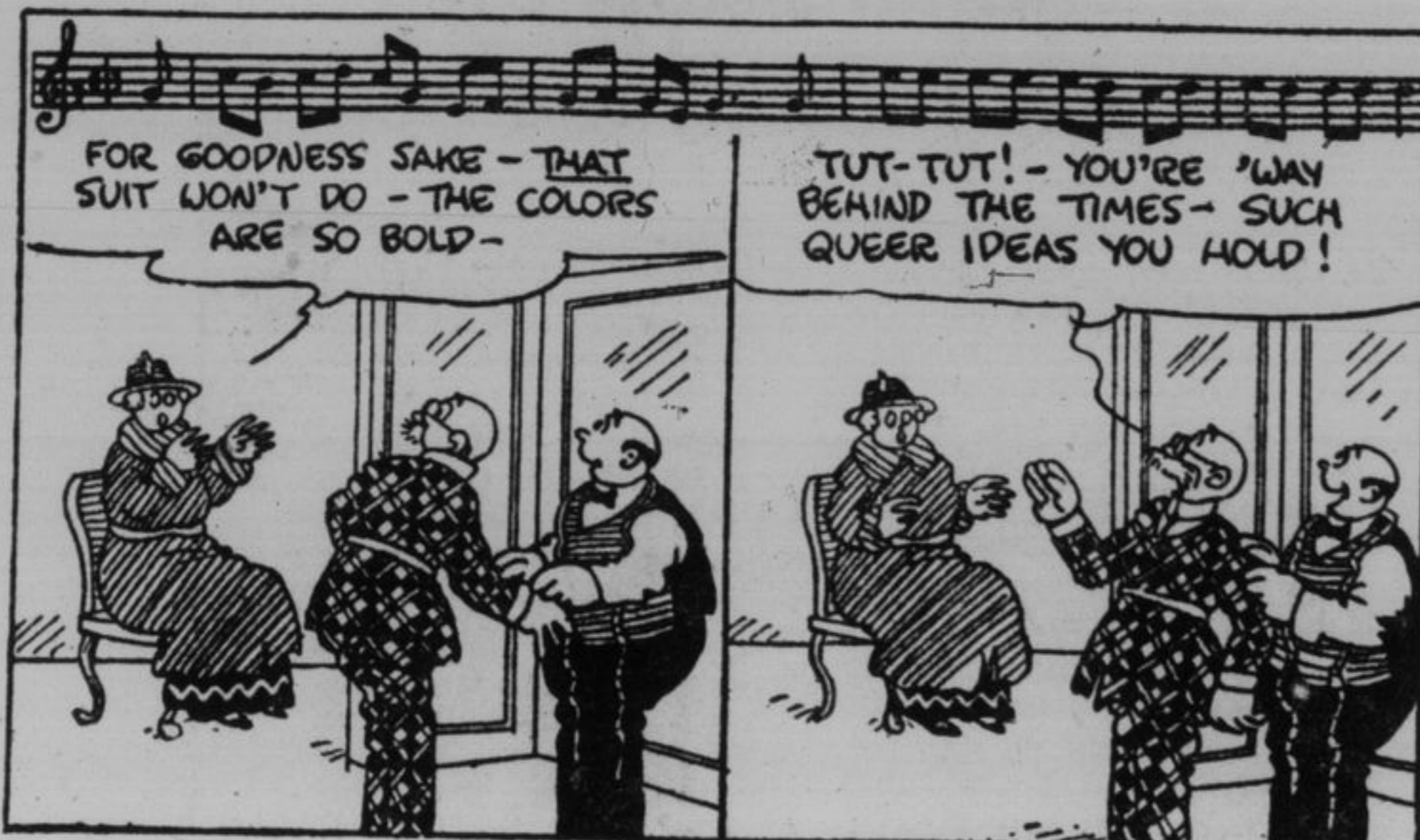
There are few teams which comprise better sportsmen than the R.C.A. outfit entered in the senior city hockey league. Of course baseball is a funny game anyway.

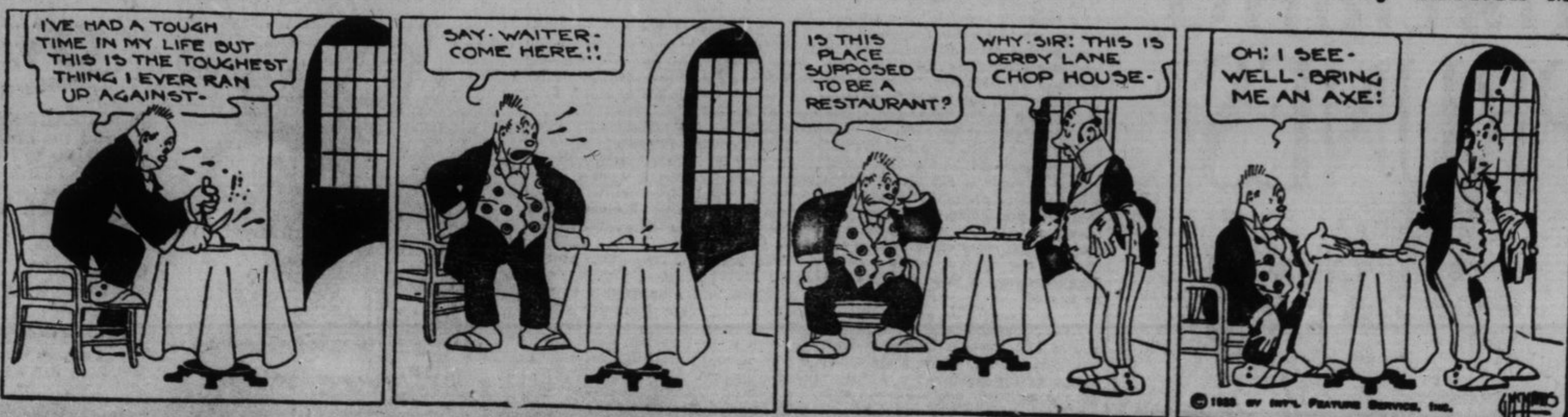

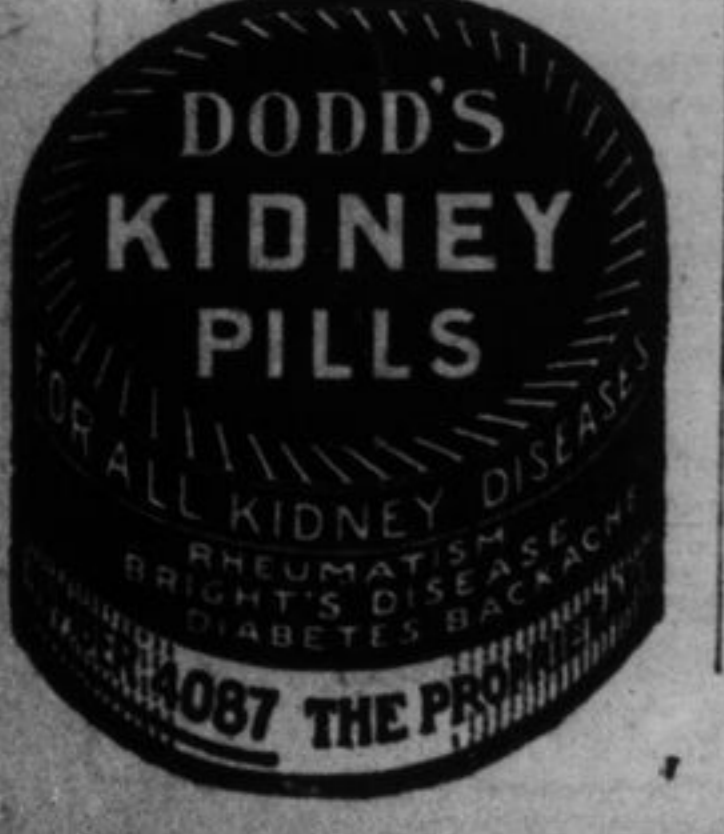
