L. E. T.: "One of your Column Readers asked for directions for cro-Omelet, cheting a Doughnut Bean Bag. Here are mine; Buy a moderate size of brown silkateen. Chain 50 stitches. Join Ch. 3, then I d. c. in each chain. (By 'd. c.' I mean thread over once only before going through into chain).

> Second Row: Widen by putting 2 d. c. in every fifth stitch. Third Row: Just like first row.

Now widen fourth sixth and eighth rows. Make nine rows in all. Break thread. Go to original chain and make 1 d. c. in other side of each stitch of chain. Then make second half just like first. After nine rows are completed, crochet the two parts together, leaving a small hole through which to fill very




