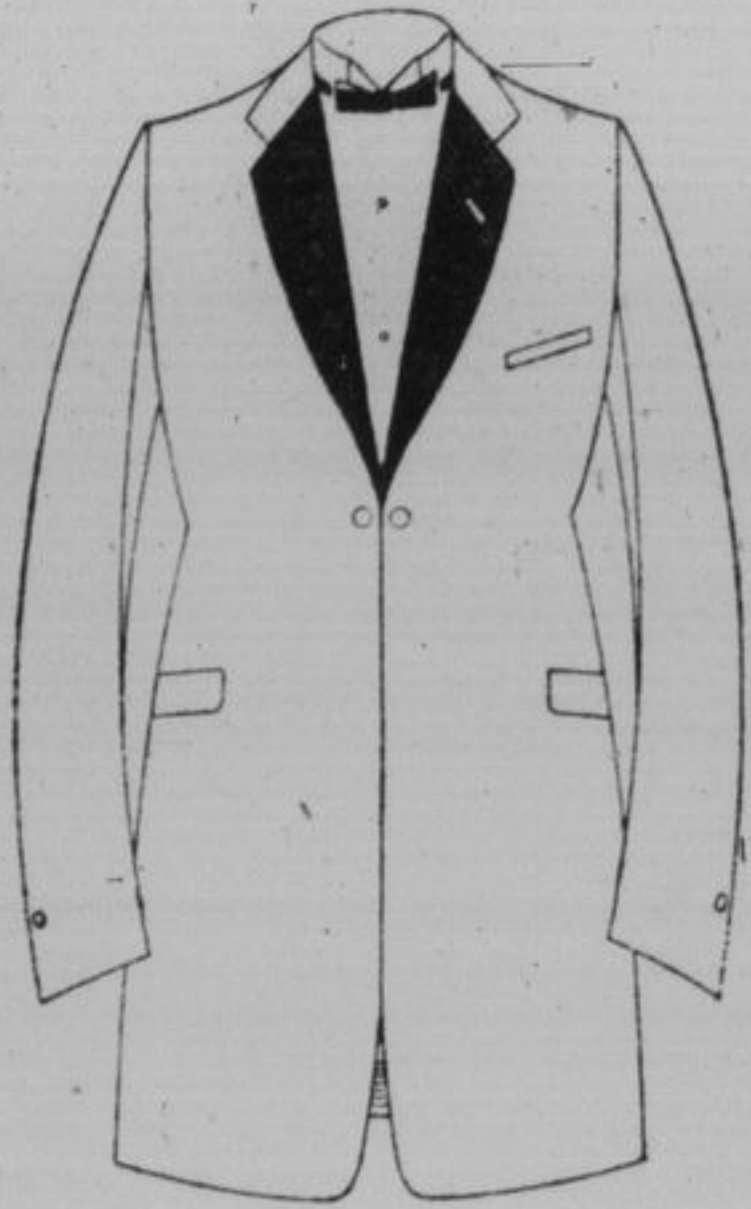

**SPLENDID SALE
OF CITY BONDS**

Kingston Receives the Highest
Price Recorded in Toronto
in Some Time.

City Treasurer O. V. Bartels is receiving congratulations on the excellent sale he made last week of a city of Kingston bond issue of \$175,000 for the new contagious hospital. The bonds sold to R. A. Daly & Co., Toronto, on a bid of 102.38, or approximately 5.31. The city treasurer's congratulations come from various financial concerns, which state that he did a wise thing when he put the Kingston bond issue on the market at this time.

One big Toronto concern writes: "You certainly received the highest price that has been paid yet for any Ontario, municipal, or in fact, any provincial bonds that have been sold around here for some time, and it certainly shows the standing with which the city of Kingston is regarded by buyers up here." The concern is now sorry it did not bid just a little higher to get the issue, for it is understood the successful bidders have already sold out the whole block.
