**GENERAL HOSPITAL IS VERY BUSY NOW**

The Reception Room Has to Be Used for Unfortunate Patients.

The February meeting of the Board of Governors was held Tuesday evening, the attendance not being quite as large as usual. The governors were pleased to welcome Mr. Sibbet, warden of the County, who was present in his official capacity. He was asked to be one of the visiting governors for the present month in connection with Walter Cooke. The report from acting medical superintendent, Dr. Pikey, was particularly instructive and presented in a very interesting manner. It was reported to the board that at no time since the epidemic of influenza a few years ago which was so fatal, had the hospital been as busy as at the present time. Even the reception room being used to accommodate patients. W. G. Simmons having duly qualified was unanimously admitted as a member. The chairman made a verbal report on the progress being made with the new buildings, speaking particularly of the service building which is now receiving the last finishing touches. The contractor for the kitchen equipment has his men now at work and nothing more up-to-date could be found anywhere. It should be in operation early in March. The addition to the new Empire Wing is progressing and will be ready in the spring. The Isolation Hospital has the roof on the whole building and the windows all in; heat will soon be turned on.

Several applications have been accepted for admission to the Training school.

**BUSHMEN IN DEMAND.**

But Cutting Of Ice Is Keeping Men Busy.

It was learned on Wednesday morning that the local office of the Ontario Labor Employment Bureau had an application for twenty-five experienced bushmen, and had been unable to get the help required. When asked the reason for being unable to fill the order, Allen Stroud, the local agent stated that so many are employed cutting ice, that it was almost impossible to get men to do other work. This was clearly shown on Wednesday morning, when there were only about seven or eight men in the employment office, as compared to forty or fifty previous to the commencement of ice cutting.
