BOARD OF WORKS HAS PAYING PLAN
A Claim Against the City Has Been Entered by Mrs. James Grant.

The street paving programme for 1923 was definitely settled at a meeting of the board of works on Wednesday afternoon, and authority was given to the city engineer to call for tenders for the necessary supplies.
 Alderman Sargent, chairman of the board, presided and those present were Aha. C. C. Nash, E. Godwin, J. Johnston, W. Holder and Mayor Angrave.
 A letter was read from Messrs. Nickle, Parrot and Day giving notice of a claim against the city by Mrs. James Grant for injuries received when she was thrown from a sleigh, an accident alleged to be due to the condition of Princess street. It was referred to the city solicitor.

H. C. Nickle attended as a representative of the Utilities Commission which had sent in a letter containing the list of streets ready for paving. The list adopted was as follows: King street from Princess to Queen street; King street from William to West street; Union from King to Wellington; Gore from King to Wellington; Earl from King to Wellington; Stephen from Montreal to Division; Wellington from Princess to Bay; York from Barrie to Division; Alfred from Princess to the fair grounds; Albert from Union to Princess; Brock from Alfred to Nelson; and Rideau from Barrack to North.
 It was pointed out that the work for the entire season is limited to two miles and that some of the streets named may not be reached during the time available.

There was some discussion on the report of the sub-committee appointed to inquire into the proposal to open County street and negotiations will be continued with property owners whose land is required for the right of way.

The engineer directed attention to the expiration of Roddy and Monk's contract for stone, and he was authorized to call for new tenders. The purchase of a car-load of ties at 35 cents per tie was authorized.

A charge against Robert Jamieson for service placed in a lot on Montreal street was ordered to be removed as it was not chargeable to him and an order was made for the return to him of taxes paid amounting to \$118.30.

The matter of the sewer through the Allen property was brought up in a letter from the city auditor stating that while the solicitors for the Allen estate had given consent on behalf of the Allen estate all of the parties interested had not yet signed the necessary documents.

PROFESSOR MITCHELL

Gives Splendid Address on "Humor" at R.M.C.

"True humor does not hold anyone up to ridicule," stated Professor G. W. Mitchell in an entertaining address to the cadets of the Royal Military College, on Wednesday. "Some things are quite wrongly considered as humor, such as satire, which is not entirely kind in its substance. True humor does not hold anyone up to ridicule."

Prof. Mitchell is always a welcome visitor to the R.M.C. and his reception when he rose to address the cadets on Wednesday afternoon testified to the warm esteem in which he is held at the Point Frederick Institution. His able address at the college last year on "Julius Caesar and the Field Service Regulations" is still remembered by the senior classes, and consequently his talk to the cadets was to them the realization of a pleasure they had anticipated for several days.

In his address the speaker pointed out the traits of different countries and showed how the customs of a country can be developed along extremely humorous lines. As one example the case of an Englishman and a German at dinner was pointed out. The German tucked his napkin under his chin, whereupon the Englishman enquired politely if he thought he was in a barber shop.

The criterion of humor is that it must be a criticism of life in a few words. This may be done by anecdote, or by the relation of personal experiences or the experiences of others or in the form of a tale. Prof. Mitchell gave numerous illustrations and almost convulsed the cadets with laughter at the amusing stories he related.

Himself of Scottish birth, Prof. Mitchell has the national enjoyment of anecdotes detrimental to Scottish traits, though in many cases the stories are directly contrary to Scottish customs. Though Scots are truly generous, the anecdotes regarding their thrift are rather magnified, as is instanced by the Englishman and his Scotch friend who sat down to breakfast together. The Englishman, looking at his friend's bowl of porridge said, "Are you going to have it, or have you had it?"

Col. T. V. Anderson, D.S.O., who is acting commandant, during the illness of General Sir Archibald Macdonell, who is confined to his bed at the General Hospital, thanked Prof. Mitchell for his able address and the cadets showed their appreciation of it by prolonged applause. There is no doubt that Prof. Mitchell will always be a welcomed lecturer at the Royal Military College.

"THE CAT AND THE CANARY."

Good Mystery Play Presented at the Grand, Wednesday Evening.

"The Cat and the Canary" presented at the Grand on Wednesday evening, is a good mystery play. True, it gave the audience what is known as the "croops," but it was well acted, and enjoyed by the audience. As in "The Bat," recently played at the Grand, the plot is very cleverly woven, and the villain who creates all the trouble—and there are three acts brimful of exciting events—is not unmasked until the end of the play. But apart from the startling events, which grip the audience, the play also contains humor of a most amusing nature. As in "The Bat," it keeps the audience guessing all through the piece as to the identity of the guilty party. Just as soon as one of the characters is picked out as the trouble-maker, the blame for it all appears to fall on another party. In the leading role of Annabelle West, Shirley Booth was charming. Her work was most convincing, especially in her spells of nervousness. Elsie Esmond, as Susan Silby was exceptionally good. W. Lee, as Paul Jones, was very clever in his part, which created much amusement. Alma Kruger handled the difficult role of "Mammy" Pleasant well, while special mention is also due Harold Hartsell, as Roger Cusby; George Lettingwell, as Harry Blythe; Richard Farrell, as Charles Wilder and Marian Tanner, as Clirely Young.

FARM LANDS FLOODED

Result of Ice Jam at Foot of Long Saugli Raids
 Brockville, Feb. 8.—Residents of the vicinity of Aultsville are looking for a repetition of the flooding and damage to property which occurred some years ago as the result of an ice jam in the St. Lawrence. Already the jam has resulted in some flooding of farm lands adjacent to the St. Lawrence, and it is predicted that within a week, if present conditions continue, telephone lines will be down in the neighborhood and highways will be impassable. The jam is caused by ice piling up at the foot of the rapids.
