

The two chief reasons appear to be that there is a genuine desire on the part even the church unionists to avoid anything akin to a split in the church, even on this question; and that the die-hards, with characteristic Scottish obstinacy, are fighting to the bitter end. It is said that an Irishman will fight over his politics and a Scotchman over his religion; and the truth of the latter phrase seems to be borne out in the struggle which is taking place on the question of union of the Presbyterian church with the others.

The chief claim made by the union party is that the church has already voted twice on the subject: once in 1911, and once in 1915, and on both of these occasions a handsome majority for union was recorded. In 1911 the majority was over 50,000. ped to 32,000, a reduction of 18,000. This is used as a fairly good reason for asking for another vote on the question; and there is a large body, many of whom are in favor of union, who advocate letting the church members again express their wishes. They point to several good reasons for taking a vote this year. One is the reduction of the majority between 1911 and 1915. They also claim that in 1915 thousands of the church members and adherents were overseas and unable to vote on the question. And, lastly, they point to the fact that one hundred thousand new members have joined the church since the last vote was taken, and that these new members should be given an opportunity of expressing anticipate damand and use good even if minety per cent. of the church members wanted it.
