The Science dance of 1923 will long be remembered by those who were fortunate enough to be present in Grant Hall on Wednesday evening for not only was no trouble spared to make the fine hall more beautiful for this festive occasion, but the ingenuity of the Canadian youth, trained in Queen's celebrated Science school, had devised surprises and novelties which surpassed those of all previous years.

Evergreens, soft by shaded lights, a crescent moon added an attractive touch. Balloons in the col-

lege colors were caught with streamers to evergreens to the balcony where the spectators enjoyed the music and looked down on the charming scene. The vogue for gay colors, silver and gold cloth and sequins made the ball room a riot of color, the scarlet tunics of several cadets from the Royal Military College lending an added touch of scarlet. Overhead were strung countless balloons of red, blue and yellow, each with streamers attached and in the centre was a contrivance, which the great grand-fathers of the young men who invented it would have called "black art," in which mirrors were arranged in some marvelous fashion that gave during the moonlight dance the effect of millions of fire flies flitting among the dancers. Showers of confetti were arranged to fall at a given time and through another electrical mystery, the balloons fell at the flying feet of the guests. In the corridor a punch bowl was set in a block of ice in which colored lights glowed. The Red Room was arranged as a sitting out place with cosy corners, a fire glowed on the hearth and light, shaded with red gave a rosy tint to the dainty frocks of the guests. Across the hall a class room was arranged as a moonlit grove of evergreens with most artist's effect and named the Blue Room.
