**ITS BEST YEAR.**

The Sun Life Assurance Company

The financial statement issued by

**Many Men Got Work.**

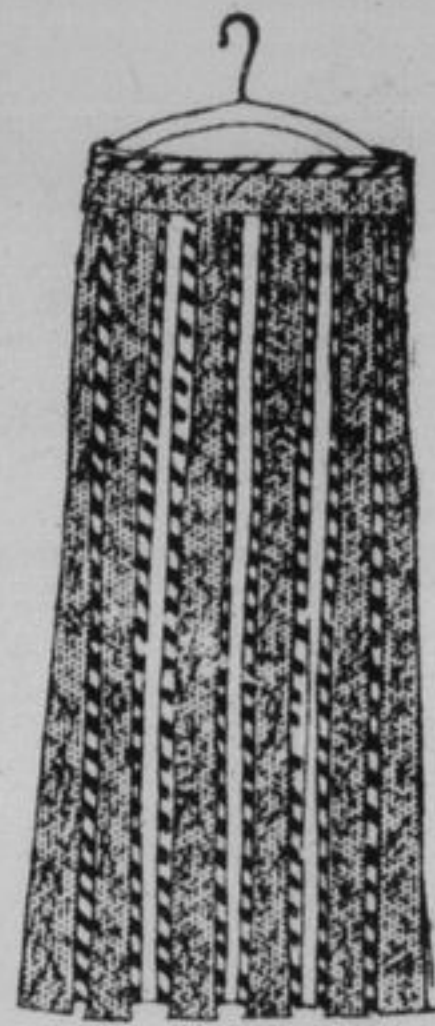
It is an ill wind that does not do

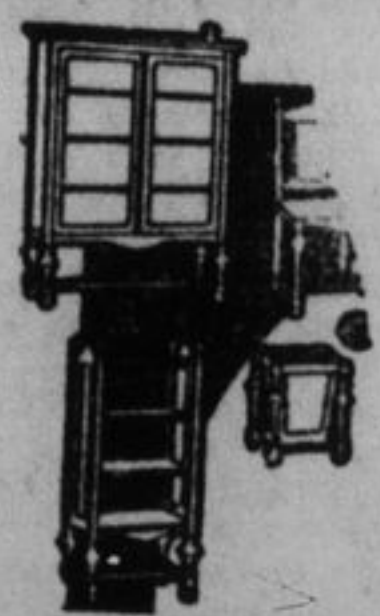
