COLLEGE FROLICS OF 1923 HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL

It Was a Decidedly Popular Attraction—Crowded to the Doors.

"The College Frolics of 1923," presented by the students of Queen's University at the Grand Opera House on Tuesday evening, proved to be one of the most popular attractions of the season. Every available inch of accommodation was taken by the lusty students and their friends, and hundreds who had attempted to secure seats were disappointed through the scarcity of tickets.

Undergrads in the "gods" provided the usual supply of beans, paper and witty remarks during the performance, but the order maintained was excellent during the various acts. Under the able direction of J. C. Macgillivray, convenor; G. C. Monture, production manager; and H. S. Griffin, musical director, the skits arranged by the various faculties and organizations caused illimitable enthusiasm and applause.

Science presented "The Kickoff Patrol," dealing with a day in a Bolshevik camp, which provided as much amusement as the burlesque of arts, entitled, "The Wrecks Shock Company." The Levana act, "Now and Then," was very pretty and the Spanish songs and dances in "Lacachua" were most enjoyable. "Albatross, the World's Worst Magician," was the medical offering and vied for honors with "Second Down, Socrates," presented by the Bolsheviks, a well-known college organization. Specialties between acts were presented by N. S. Knapp and E. I. Holmes in acrobatic feats; G. M. Parsons and G. W. Parsons in cornet selections; A. E. Chalmers, R. F. B. Taylor and E. R. Brydon in saxophone trios; Austin F. Cross and J. C. Elliott in a negro dialogue, and Clara Farrell, Lois Taylor and Helen Tofield in a pony dancing act. The last was one of the outstanding hits of the show and was deserving of special commendation.

There was not a weak act in the show, the scenery changes were quick and there was enough variety to prevent any flagging of enthusiasm during the evening. A splendid feature of the performance was the dancing of Miss Gladys Montgomery and Rolfe Graham during the Bolshevik act. They went through the gamut of dances with considerable skill and grace and were heartily applauded. After the performance a dance was held in the City Hall, where several hundred of the actors and their friends made merry until an early hour.

On Wednesday morning the work of moving the offices of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and the Labor Unemployment bureau to the new location on Market street was commenced.
