PRESSURE ON GERMANY.

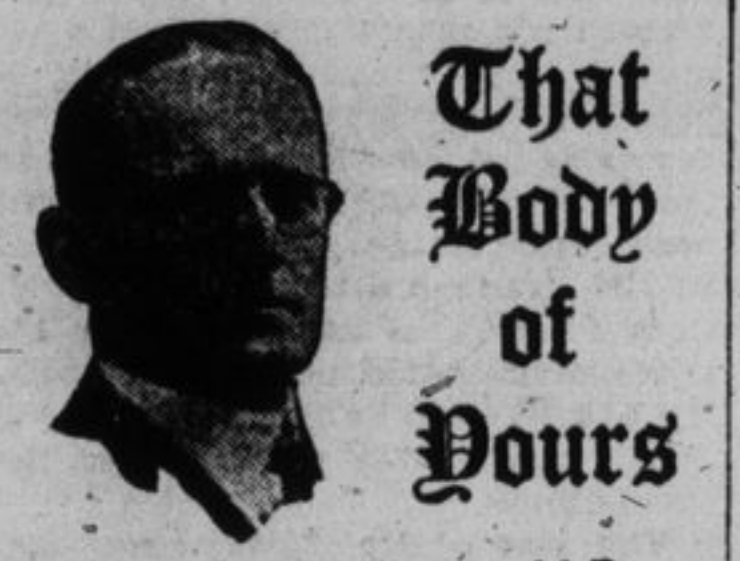
The magnitude of the task France undertook when she occupied the Ruhr industrial region of Germany is only now being realized. Tentative resistance is stronger than was expected, and difficulties in the Ruhr of the French have developed.

Harsher measures against recalcitrant populations of the occupied areas may be necessary.

However, that these will be other than defensive, in the nature of suppressing disorders and punishing sniping of French soldiers, is not probable. Patience on the part of the French will be rewarded by capitulation of the Germans ultimately.

The German magnates who have been exploiting Germany are credited with having enormous sums of money deposited in foreign lands and are supposed to be capable of buying necessary supplies abroad.

Statesmen at Paris disavow the thought even of separating the Ruhr from Germany. There is serious danger that they will be compelled to change their programme if Germany is too long unyielding.

That Body of Yours

Pain In The Back. When one thinks of the back with apparently nothing there but bone—back bone, the wonder is that any trouble should ever arise in that region.

Now the majority of the aches or pains that occur at these curves are due to weakness, to fatigue from overwork, or most frequently from faulty position standing or sitting.

These muscles were meant for hard work, which modern civilization has rendered unnecessary for most people, and so at these very curved points in the natural curves more strain is put upon the muscles to hold you erect.

Now why all this? Because you should really cultivate a proper carriage, standing or sitting, and prevent pain in your back.

For instance, pain in the curve of the neck may be due to Neuralgia, between the shoulder blades to gas on the stomach, or real stomach trouble, in the small of the back to too much waste matter in the intestine, and the very lowest point to strain of the joint between the hip bone and spine.

Q—Canada is said to have a new buffalo herd, in addition to the 4,000 in the Buffalo Farm in Alberta. If so, where? A—The discovery is reported of a herd of 5,000 wild buffalo (the American Bison) in Northern Alberta, between the Peace and Slave Rivers and the Great Slave Lake.
