HUSSARS AGAIN DEFEAT FRONTENAC REGIMENT

Both Teams Now Tied for Group Honors and Will Enter Semi-Finals.

The Frontenacs went down to defeat at the hands of the 4th Hussars on Tuesday night in one of the most keenly-contested indoor baseball games witnessed in the Armouries this season, the losers taking the count by 11 to 9. The win for the Hussars places them in a tie for first place in Group "B" and assures them of entry in the semi-finals.

The 4th Hussars had a stiff task to accomplish last night and they went into the fray with grim determination written all over their faces. They finished the job on hand in first-class style and all credit is due to them for a hard-earned victory.

The game attracted the record crowd of the season and prominent among the spectators were a number of the players and members of the Heavy Battery, who were naturally hoping that the Hussars would go under; a loss for the latter giving the Heavies another go at the championship. However, the cavalrymen were out to win from the start of the game, and apparently they will be heard from again before the finals are completed.

The Frontenacs were equally determined and it surely would have been great fun for them to have been able to watch the Heavies and the Hussars fight it out for second place. Perhaps they were a little too confident of this pleasure.

There is very little to comment on concerning the game. Both teams played exceptionally good ball, the Hussars having seven errors chalked up against them and the Frontenacs five. The winners knocked out 14 clean hits, while the losers obtained 11. Sands struck out three Hussars, while he was the lone victim by this route at the hands of Gourdier. The rest of the play may be fairly well judged from the score by innings. The contest was staged in slightly over sixty minutes.

McCullough stood out for the losers and his work in right field was brilliant, if not sensational. Sands tried a good game but his main strength appeared to be in the A-1 support given him by his mates. On the play the Frontenacs have nothing to be ashamed of and their good work last night would have certainly pulled them a victory if the Hussars had not been right on their toes. The latter team played their second best game of the season last night, the only other contest that passed this showing being the battle with District Headquarters earlier in the season. On that occasion only one error was recorded against them. Gourdier pitched the best game of his short career in the box thus living up to his reputation of improvement with every contest. Of the other players nothing need be said except that they were out to play the game, and they won.

QUEEN'S BASKETBALL GIRLS GO TO MONTREAL

To Take Part in Intercollegiate League Games With Varsity and McGill.

The ten girls who will represent Queen's university in the Intercollegiate basketball league, which takes place in Montreal on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, left for that city Wednesday noon. The Queen's girls were in charge of Miss Edna Chown, who is director of physical education for the girls at the university. The Queen's team has been practising faithfully for the contest and expect to turn in two good games. The following girls left for Montreal: Winnifred Martin, Kathleen Lockhart, Gladys Montgomery, Uriel Kelso, Jessie Pritchard, Dorothy Shannon, Roberta Vince, Jean Crosswell, Gertrude Miliken and Helen Miller. The Queen's team will present one of the strongest defences which has been at the university in years. Jessie Pritchard and Winnifred Martin, who are almost certain to be selected for the guard positions, are wonderful players and will keep the Varsity and McGill girls going if they score many baskets. The forwards have not been picked, but Kathleen Lockhart, Gladys Montgomery and Roberta Vince are the most likely to be chosen.

It is not known whether Queen's will play Varsity or McGill in the opening game. A schedule was suggested by the McGill team but Queen's objected to any schedule being drawn up until two-thirds of the teams competing were present. The result of Queen's objection was that the schedule will be arranged on Thursday morning in Montreal when all the captains and managers are present.

It is understood that the officials who will handle the games, will referee the contests very carefully and for that reason Queen's girls will play the game strictly according to the rules decided upon at the meeting held last year in Kingston. Queen's will play both Varsity and McGill.

It has been arranged that Queen's and Varsity girls will play an exhibition match with a team representing the McGill School of Physical Education. These girls are not permitted to enter the Intercollegiate league but are allowed to play exhibition matches with any of the teams in the grouping.

The Queen's girls will return to the city on Sunday noon. It is expected that in the very near future matters will be so arranged that home and home games will be played in the Girls' Intercollegiate basketball league the same as the boys' teams do.

A GRIDIRON HERO

From "braking" on the railroad to star halfback on the Princeton football team is the story of Harry W. Crum, famous plunging halfback on the champion Argos of 1922.

Crum, who was a star halfback at Princeton last fall, left the caboose of a Pennay freight train at Derry, Pa., to enter the hall of fame as a college man. After working as a fireman and then as freight brakeman, he resigned in August, 1920, to enter Princeton. Every Pittsburg division employee, especially those around Derry, is brimming with pride at Crum's great success.

He is a brother of Charles O. and Ralph C. Crum of that little town in the hills. The latter Crum is a passenger brakeman on the Pittsburgh division and a son of the late Philip E. Crum, freight conductor. Standing 5 feet 11 inches in his stocking feet, aged 23 and weighing 180 pounds, Crum has proved himself one of the greatest line plungers in the history of Nassau. He won the Harvard game by scoring the only touchdown made. It was the first defeat Princeton had chalked against Harvard on the latter's field in 26 years.

In the game with Chicago Crum scored two of the three touchdowns his team registered. Against Yale he saved the day by stopping Jordan less than a yard from Princeton's goal.

Prior to his matriculation at Princeton Crum starred with the Derry high school team and played on the famous Penn State freshman team of 1917. Besides his railroad work he also taught at Derry high school and coached its football team. Crum is a junior at Princeton. It is expected that the 1923 team

will be built around this sensational grid athletic, a tower of strength both on offense and defense.

Not only is Crum a star on the gridiron but also ranks high in the class room. He is taking an expert accountant course.

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
