CACHE OF MUNITIONS SEIZED IN NEW YORK

Accidental Discovery Was Made by a Policeman on His Beat.

New York, Feb. 27 .- A big cache of modern military arms and ammunition was discovered and seized in New York late, yesterday afternoon, and the authorities began an investigation in which their suspicions, at first directed against the Irish rebels, turned to the Ku Klux
