CACHE OF MUNITIONS SEIZED IN NEW YORK

Accidental Discovery Was Made by a Policeman on His Boat.
 New York, Feb. 27.—A big cache of modern military arms and ammunition was discovered and seized in New York last night, yesterday afternoon, and the authorities began an investigation in which their suspicions, at first directed against the Irish rebels, turned to the Ku Klux Klan.
 The seizure consisted of two tons of munitions including machine guns, rifles, hand grenades and cartridges which were found in the basement of a twelve family tenement at No. 265 West Twenty-fourth street. The explosives included 72,000 rounds of .303 calibre rifle ammunition, 5,000 steel-jacketed .45 calibre revolver cartridges and thirty boxes of machine gun magazines, all loaded.
 Two men, Joseph O'Bryne, janitor of the Twenty-fourth street house, and Edward Hoye, a truckman, of No. 789 Ninth avenue, were arrested and were held in \$2,500 bail each for examination on Thursday. They were arraigned on affidavits charging violation of that section of the bond law which prohibits storage of explosives without a permit.
