VERONA ENTERS COUNTY FINALS

Defeated Sunbury 5-2 in Play-off on Tuesday.

By defeating Sunbury 5-2 at the Jock Hart Arena here yesterday afternoon Verona has qualified to enter the senior finals of the County Hockey with Wolfe Island and will give the Islanders something to think over for the final honours.

Sunbury and Verona played to a tie in the semifinals, each winning on home ice by two goals, but when the Verona team got on the larger ice surface their greater speed and better combination play told and they were masters from the beginning, though at times they would have been forced to fight much harder for their game had not Revelle, in goal, turned aside many Sunbury shots.

A crowd of nearly a thousand people turned out for the game and gave the Kingston hockey fans a good example with their whole-hearted and good-natured support of their respective teams.

The first period—or rather the face-off of the puck at the beginning of the game—started the excitement and it lasted until the final gong, with Referee Joe Smith a busy man. Each team scored once in the first round and in the second Verona jumped into the lead with two goals in quick succession. In the third they gathered two more, while Sunbury could notch but one, and that a high fly which was interfered with by Manson and dropped over Revell's shoulder.

Penalties were fairly thick, Patterson, of Sunbury, drawing the greater number. Martin, of Verona received a cut over the eye in the second period but was able to continue.

Much of Verona's success was due to the fine combination of Merrill and Craig and the beautiful rushes of the Trousdale brothers, while the Gordon brothers and Noble worked well for Sunbury.

FRONTENACS AND HUSSARS ON TOP

Enter Finals of the Garrison Indoor Baseball League.

The 4th Hussars and Frontenacs will enter the championship finals of the Garrison indoor baseball league by virtue of their victories in the semi-final games staged at the Armories on Tuesday night. In the initial game the Hussars defeated "B" Battery by 16 to 6; while in the second contest the Frontenac Regiment took rather an easy victory from "A" Battery to the tune of 31-4.

The galleries of the Armories were crowded with interested spectators and the cheering was very impartial throughout, although the supporters of the battery teams were naturally disappointed in the two losses suffered. Both the losing teams went down to defeat without disgrace and their players showed a real sporting spirit even when the issue of a chance in the final stared them in the face. The two battery teams are composed of real sportsmen and the best of the opposing players and fans alike are off to them for their splendid work which deserved better luck upon more occasions than one.

In the opening game the "B" Battery players jumped into the lead for one inning, but the Hussars came back in the second and were never headed from then on. Both teams played good ball and the fielding was exceptionally good for baseball of the indoor variety. "B" Battery had only four errors against them while the Hussars had eight. Gourdier struck out three of the artillerymen and the battery twirler scored just as the one S.O. to his credit. The former pitcher was injured in the eighth inning and had to be carried off the field. He was brought around almost a few minutes later, and pluckily returned to the conflict. The Hussars knocked out 19 clean hits to 11 for the battery.

The second contest was very much one-sided and the men from "A" Battery practically lost the game in the

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third innings when twelve of the Frontenacs trotted across the home plate. Another comedy of errors on the part of the battermen had a great deal to do with the scoring of ten more of the infantrymen in the seventh, and although the losers never lost heart it was apparent to all that they rapidly lost ground after the first three innings. Even at that they shut out the Frontenacs in four of the sessions, and if they could have steadied down the score might have been much more even. However the winners were the best team on the night's play, although to the credit of the losers they gave off their very best with three of their regulars, including their star pitcher, off the team.

All interest will now centre in the opening game of the championship series on Thursday night. The game will be called at 7.30 o'clock and as the first game means a lot of advantage both outfits will be out to win from the start. On the dope both teams are well-matched, the Hussars having defeated the Frontenacs twice in the regular schedule.
