ONE HUNDRED HEIRS MEET

Many of the heirs present had received copies of the circular, and they attended the meeting for the purpose of obtaining information. Among those who attended were residents of the city of Kingston, Frontenac, Leeds Lennox and Adington and Prince Edward counties. Many had at different times sought information from the official records of the city of New York where the property, said to have formed the vast estate of Anneke Jans Bogardus, is located. They claimed kinship through the Bogardus and Brower descendants of Anneke Jans Bogardus, who at an early date settled in the province of Ontario. The name Brower is the Dutch form of Brewer, found in Brewer's Mills, so named after one John Brewer, an engineer, who built the Rideau locks at Brewer's Mills, and who left a very large number of descendants.

Canadian Descendants.

Among the strong branches in Canada claiming direct descent are the Days, Warrmans, Asselstines, of Collins' Bay, Maxwells, Brewers, Garretts, Websters, Actons, of Brewer's Mills, Jacksons, of Wagarville, and Storrington township, Middletons, of Lyndhurst, Deneys, Webbers and Wards. From the official records prepared in New York City the first Brower to come to Canada appears to be Daniel Brower, son of Henry Brower, born in Onida county, New York State, Feb. 28th, 1820, and who settled in Hollowell, Canada West, where he married Mary B. Hubbs, May 10th, 1843. Their children were Benjamin Way Brewer, Alva Henry, Sarah Jimima and Margaret Jane, born in Hollowell, and Charles Watson, Carman and Elizabeth Adaline born at Hillier, Charles Watson Brewer died in Roslin, Hastings county, Oct. 8th, 1907.

Among those present at the meeting were Mrs. Annie Shales of this city, whose grandmother was a Brower; Alfred Garrett, Inverary; Edward Asselstine, whose mother, Mrs. John Asselstine, Collins' Bay, has family papers showing her descent; William Wallace Brewer, LeLand, who is a direct descendant of John Brower, whose father, John Brower built the Rideau locks at Brewer's Mills now bearing his name; Alexander Jackson, Wagarville whose grandmother was a sister of Phillip Brower of Glenburnie; Mrs. Marsh, 49 John street, Kingston whose family papers date back to 1796 showing her to be a descendant of Elizabeth Brower Jackson, Ernest Acton, Brewer's Mills, whose great-grandmother, he says, was a Brower, but he has no papers. George Ashley attended as representative of Walter Deneys, of Toronto, who is one of the Canadian heirs. McVillie Reid, 61 Division street, is an heir through his grandmother, Mrs. Susan Middleton who holds documents dating back to 1823 showing her direct descent from Anneke Jans Bogardus. Z. M. Middleton, Lyndhurst, is a descendant through his mother, Hanna Middleton, who was a Bogardus, and who holds authenticated family records showing her direct descent from Anneke Jans Bogardus. This record, prepared by C. G. Gifford, St. Lawrence county, New York, forty years ago, is in manuscript, and is said to show a chronology that establishes the family's identity with the estate. George Brewer, Battersea, is said to be the only survivor in the vicinity bearing that name.

Anneke Jans Bogardus. "According to the official records of the Jacobus Brower and Anneke Jans Bogardus families as compiled by the headquarters of the national committee at Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Anneke was the daughter of William Prifree of Orange who afterwards became King of Holland. She was born in or about the year 1602, and her maiden name was Anneke or Anna, Webber.

"On or about 1620 she emigrated, or was sent over from Holland by King William, to the province of the New Netherlands in America. She was engaged to be married, but was not married until the year 1622. She married Rodolphe or Redoffe, Jans Janson, for her first husband. They had four children, Sarah, Catherine, Sytle and Jans Janson. That latter died without issue. Her husband died in the spring of 1634 and his widow married the Rev. Evarardus Bogardus in 1635. They had four children, Willem, Cornelius, Jans and Peter.

"While making a trip to the Fatherland, Rev. Evarardus Bogardus was shipwrecked off the coast of Wales on Sept. 27th, 1647, and perished with eighty of the vessel's crew. Peter, the youngest son, was born July 1st, 1648, and his right name was Peter Stuyvesant, and he was the son of old Governor Stuyvesant of the New Netherlands.

"Anneke Jans, widow of the Rev. Evarardus Bogardus died in Ber-
