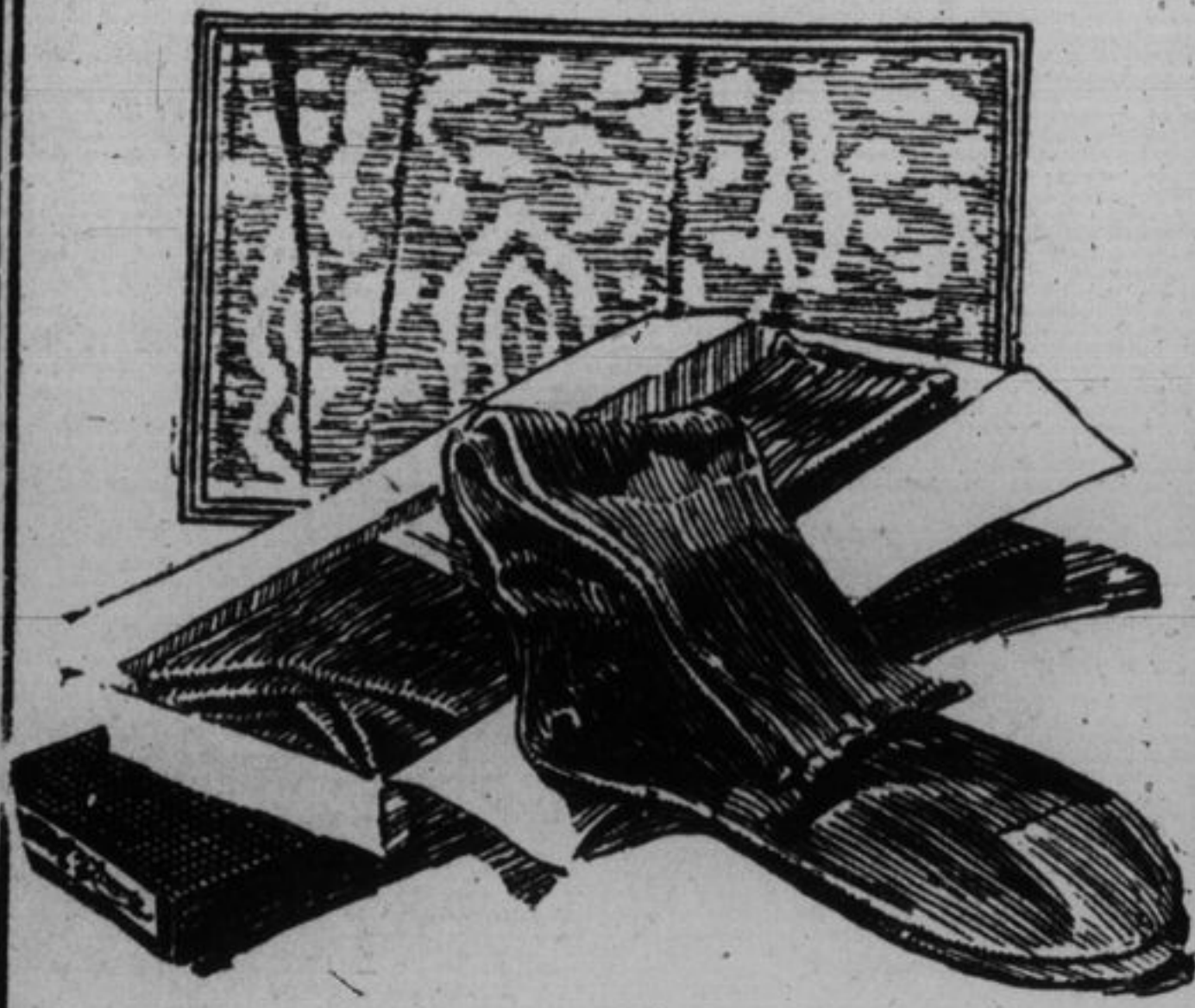

A CHAIN OF CLINICS TO BE ESTABLISHED

From Windsor to Ottawa in Regard to Cases of Tuberculosis.

A conference of the medical superintendents of the various sanatoria throughout Ontario was held on Wednesday in the office of Sir Adam Beck, Toronto. Various matters of importance to the sanatoria and, also to the community, were discussed. In order that they could be presented in a forceful manner to the provincial secretary. The provincial health officer, Dr. W. J. McCullough, made an appointment with the provincial secretary to have the deputation meet him in the afternoon. The minister was very sympathetic to the requests of the superintendents and Sir Adam Beck.

The chief features presented to him were a request that the residence rule as applied to sanatoria and general hospitals, be specifically defined, in order that the present difficulties might be done away with. The chief trouble at present is that it is impossible for these institutions, also the municipalities concerned, to determine what municipality is liable for the maintenance of indigent patients. Help in this matter has been promised by the Minister.

The other important feature was the request for aid in establishing free chest clinics throughout the province, for the diagnosis of early pulmonary tuberculosis and other chest conditions. It is proposed to establish such clinics at various strategic points in order that the services of chest specialists may be placed at the disposal of the public and profession who are at present denied their services, because of the expenses entailed. The minister was much taken with the proposal and promised his aid.

The next step is now to organize the proposal and to endeavor to establish the clinics. A committee composed of Dr. W. J. Dobbie, Weston; Dr. F. H. Pratton, London, Ont.; Dr. J. H. Holbrook, Hamilton, Ont.; and Dr. Bruce H. Hopkins, Kingston, has been instructed to organize the various districts and to present their report at the next conference, which it is hoped will be held within four or five weeks.

If the plan succeeds, and is seems impossible that it could fail, a chain of clinics will be established from Windsor to Ottawa. The various municipalities in the neighborhood of the different sanatoria will be offered the chance to secure one of the clinics. The medical profession will be asked to give its wholehearted support in each district and, if this support is forth-coming, the province of Ontario and, by that is meant the people of Ontario, will be given an opportunity to help stamp out tuberculosis in a way that has never been offered any province before.

The number of cases of undiagnosed and untreated tuberculosis in the province today runs into thousands. These unfortunate people are daily infecting the members of their families, also their friends, with the result that it is a common occurrence to see an entire household stricken down with this terrible disease. It is to be hoped that clinics will soon be established in such places as Brockville, Gananoque, Napanee and Belleville. It is also to be hoped that the proposal of the Kingston Kiwanis Club to establish a clinic in Kingston will be revived. The wholehearted support of the city council and citizens at large should be given to this worthy object. It places at the feet of the people a wonderful opportunity, and it only remains for them to accept it.

London, March 2.—Duncan Marshall, Canadian commissioner of agriculture, says he hopes to arrange for a port on the east coast of England to receive Canadian cattle with a view to giving ready access to large industrial centres in the Midlands. The ports of Glasgow, Dundee and Birkenhead and Manchester have been approved for reception of Canadian cattle.

Flynn Arrives At Penitentiary.
J. Harry Flynn, Toronto, who was sentenced to a term of two years in the Portsmouth penitentiary on the charge of indecent conduct, arrived at the prison on Thursday evening. The judge in sentencing the accused ordered that he be given ten lashes in addition to the two-year penalty. Flynn was the man who originated the demand for \$2,000 for each man who served overseas during the great war, and went to Ottawa and made the demand upon the government.
