G.W.V.A. ANNUAL MEETING

City Council Rapped For Not Organizing City's 250th Anniversary Celebration.

The annual meeting and election of officers of the Kingston branch, Great War Veterans' Association, was held on Monday evening, with a representative gathering in attendance. A very encouraging report was given by Comrade MacLaren, the treasurer, concerning the finances of the organization, in which he stated that nearly \$1,500 in outstanding liabilities had been cleared off during the year and that the local branch had a cash balance of \$709 in the bank after all expenses had been deducted.

The election of officers resulted: President, Dr. D. A. Volume; first vice-president, J. Halliday; 2nd vice-president, T. H. Flint; secretary, N. Turner; treasurer, J. W. Connor, executive committee, F. D. Van Luven, H. Ashton, F. L. Stephenson, C. Hicks, D. N. McDonell, W. Burrows, and W. Bowker (Hon.)

Comrade Sugman advocated an immediate campaign for membership and his suggestion brought about a discussion of plans to this end.

Comrade Hicks addressed the members upon the necessity of action with regard to the 250th anniversary and the following resolution was moved by the speaker, and carried unanimously:

"In view of the fact that the year 1923 will mark the 250th anniversary of the founding of the City of Kingston and that we the members of the Great War Veterans' Association are proud of the long and honorable history of our city;

"And whereas it would appear to us that the matter of celebrating the birthday of our city is being treated with antipathy by the mayor, members of the city council and other leading public bodies;

"Be it resolved that we the members of the Great War Veterans' Association go on record as approving the action of the Kingston Historical Society in their efforts to revive the memory of the founding of our ancient city, and furthermore that we deplore the fact that the above mentioned organizations have not seen fit to get behind the historical society in their splendid work."

After the regular meeting, a short executive session of the officers was held. Comrades Hicks, McDonell and Burrows were unanimously appointed to the executive, and the resignation of T. Partis, canteen steward for a number of months was accepted. A vote of appreciation was extended to Comrade Partis for his services during his tenure of duties. Applications for the position were considered. Comrade C. Killen was finally accepted.

BLAZE ON VESSEL GAVE FIREMEN STUBBORN FIGHT

Steamer City of Ottawa Suffered Heavy Damage on Monday Afternoon.

Fire which broke out on the steamer City of Ottawa, shortly before 4 o'clock on Monday afternoon, gave the firemen a stubborn fight. Considerable damage was done, but no estimate of it was given. The steamer is at the wharf of the old Montreal Transportation company.

Men have been at work on the vessel, and it is stated that the fire was caused as a result of a hot rivet falling through one of the plates into a tank of gasoline.

The firemen succeeded in getting considerable water on the blaze quickly, and prevented which might very easily have resulted in a more serious fire.

The firemen had a line of hose laid from the corner of Ontario and Queen streets, crossing the railway tracks, and as a result a C.P.R. train, coming into the city, was held up for some time.

The fire was confined to the stern of the vessel, and the greater portion of the damage was done in the stock room.

At 8:35 p.m., Monday, the firemen were given a call for a fire in a shed at the rear of 66 John street, owned by Mrs. Jarrell, with Henry Secor as tenant. The shed and contents suffered extensively, but it is stated that the loss is covered by insurance. The fire was near the home of George Cotman, Chestnut street, which had a close call.

At 5:22 p.m., Monday, the firemen were given a run to the home of Mrs. Roberts, 128 Nelson street, for a chimney fire. No damage. The call was sent in over the telephone.

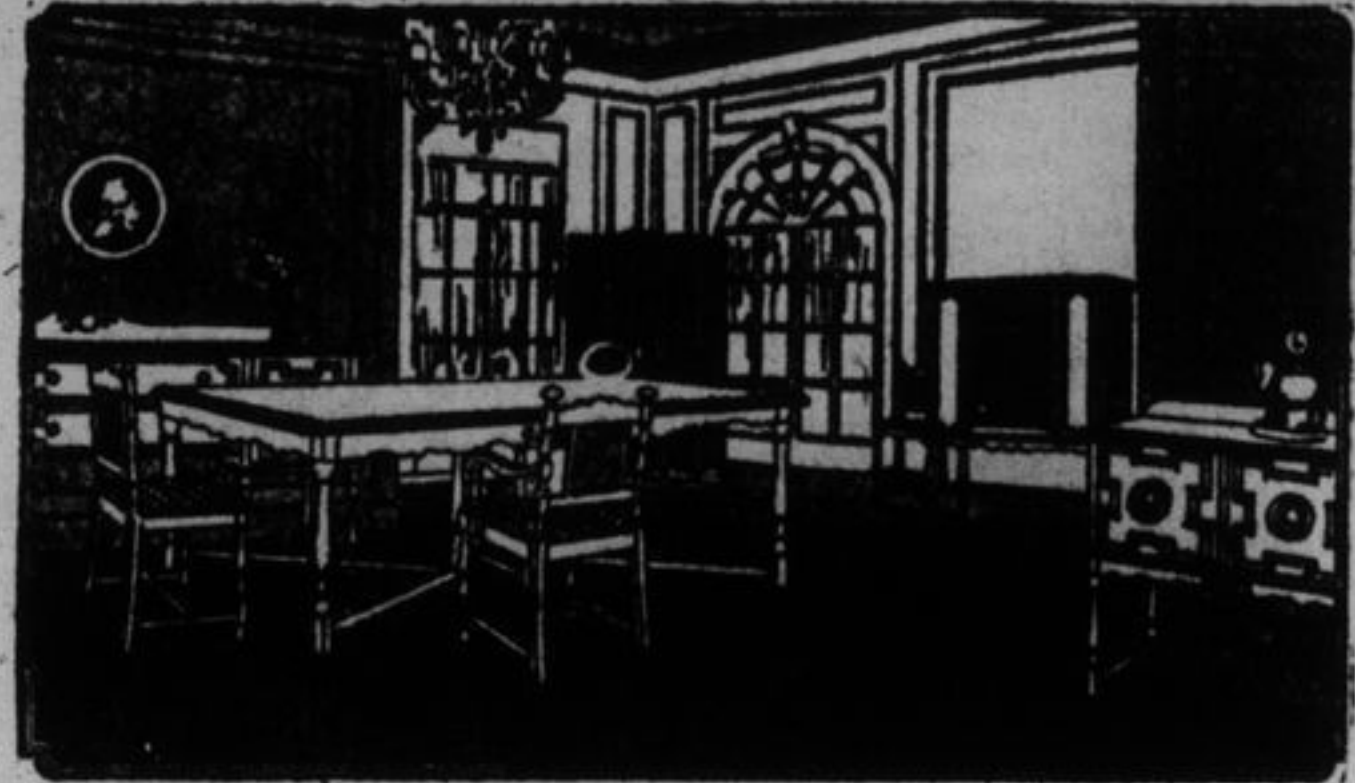

The first immigrant from the old country to arrive in Kingston so far this season, reached the city on Monday morning. The young man, who is twenty-three years of age, came from Ireland. He came to Canada on the steamer Metagama, and arrived at St. John, N.B. When he left the old country, it was his intention to settle in the United States, but he was not permitted to cross the border, so he decided to accept a position on a farm near Inverary.

Speaking to the Whig, the man stated that he had a very rough passage. Upon arrival at St. John, he was informed that he could get a position on a farm, so he decided to accept it. In view of the fact that he had worked on a farm in Ireland all his life. He stated that conditions in Ireland were more settled now. There was a great deal of newspaper talk about things taking place in that country. He claimed that the papers made a great deal more over the disturbances than they needed to.

When the young Irishman arrived in the city, he immediately went to the Ontario Labor Employment bureau, and Allan Stroud, the local agent, directed him to the stage which conveyed him to his new home.
