J. J. Newman, the golf professional, who has been with the local club for several years, will not be in Kingston this year, having accepted a position in Denver, Colo. A hearty vote of appreciation was tendered to Mr. Newman for his services while with the local club, and general regret was expressed that he was leaving. No successor has been appointed as yet.

One hundred and thirty-seven new members were admitted during the past year, the total membership now being 352. It is proposed to limit the membership to 375, but no action has been taken on this to date. C. Bermingham has donated a very handsome cup to be competed for annually in handicap competition by both men and women. A shield for men's championship competition has been provided by the retiring president, A. B. Cunningham, K.C., and Dr. J. L. Austin has donated a pair of cups for a mixed foursome competition. The members expressed appreciation over these gifts.

A review of the competition during the past year was given by President Cunningham in the course of his address. The club championship was won by Dr. McKee, the runner-up being C. G. Shannon. The Bermingham series was won by Dr. F. Cays, the runner-up being Prof. Clarke. The club played home-and-home matches with Brockville, winning at home and losing away. The Kingston players visited Peterboro and lost, but they were more successful at Picton.

Many plans were discussed for the coming season, including improvements and enlargements to the present course. The application of the Kingston Automobile Club for a site for a motorists' camp was referred to the board of directors.

WILL ISSUE THE BILLS EVERY SECOND MONTH

Monthly Payments For Gas and Electricity Abolished by Utilities Commission.

The utilities commission met this morning and dealt with the motion presented by Commissioner H. C. Nickle, at a previous meeting, to change the system of billing domestic consumers of gas and electricity so that payment would be made every two months instead of monthly as at present. Mr. Nickle read reports received from Belleville, Napanee, Port Hope, Cobourg, Peterboro, Toronto, Hamilton, Woodstock and other cities all of which issued accounts every two months. He claimed it would be an advantage.

Chairman Elliott opposed the change on the ground that consumers found it easier to pay the small monthly bill than a large amount called for in the two months' system proposed. He predicted that the arrears would be heavier in consequence also that the landlords would be hit harder by those tenants who default and leave them to pay the charges. He could not see that the change would be economical.

The motion was passed being supported by Commissioner R. E. Burns and R. N. F. McFarlane.

The resolution read: "That domestic accounts for gas and electricity be issued every two months and that the working out of the plan as to dates be left to the manager and accountant."

A list of arrears on account of water, gas and electricity was presented and the manager and accountant were instructed to proceed with the collection and report at every second meeting of the commission all consumers who are three months in arrears. They are to give notice of cutting off of service.

OBJECTS TO COUNCIL CONTINUING SESSIONS

Dr. William Spankie Says It is Adding Unnecessary Expense to County.

The county council meets again Thursday afternoon at 4.30 o'clock to consider reports of committees. A Kingston deputation will ask the co-operation of the council in the celebration of the 250th anniversary of the founding of this city. At the morning session Councillor Drew objected to a statement in the Whig of Tuesday regarding the compromise between the Ontario highway department and the council. He thought some of the councillors must have been talking too much. Dr. William Spankie wanted the council to adjourn after the Thursday morning session, claiming that it was adding unnecessary expense to the ratepayers to remain in session any longer.
