Easter Weather in Other Years. In 1902 Easter fell on March 30th and although slightly wet, the lowest temperature then recorded was 31, with the highest 48. In 1910, March 27th was Easter Sunday, and the records show it as fine and warm with the lowest temperature 34 and the highest 47. 1913 recalls a moderately chilly Easter, when March 23rd produced as her lowest temperature 25, while her highest was 38.

In 1918 it was fair and warm on Easter, which fell the last day of March and recorded a high temperature of 64, with the lowest 35. 1921 even beats this for genial warmth, showing 64 as the highest temperature on Easter Sunday, which happened March 27th, while the lowest that day was 49.

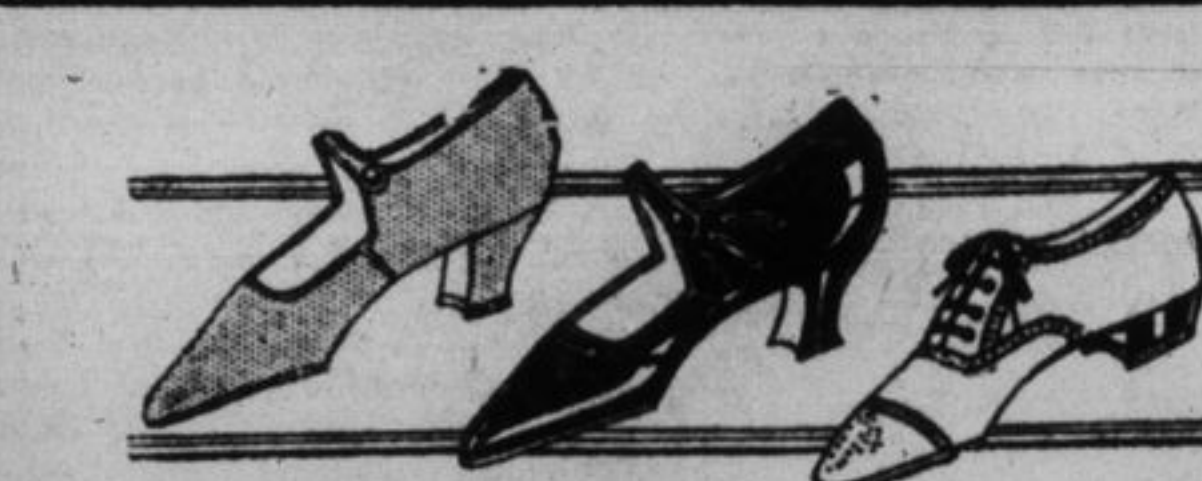
