THE HUFFMAN FAMILY 100 YEARS AT MOSCOW

The Centenary Will Be Fittingly Celebrated During the Summer.

Moscow, April 18 .- One hundred years ago, two brothers, Elija and Jacob Huffman, and a cousin, Peter Huffman, came to this locality as its first settlers. They were descendants of sturdy U. E. Loyalist stock ard by hard work, patience and industry, transformed the then wilderness into one of the finest farming sections to be found in the township of Camden, and Moscow was known for years as the "Huffman Settlement." The descendants of those early pioneers occupy sixteen farms in and around Moscow, and are among our foremost citizens, worthily maintaining their family traditions.

An interesting history of the Huffman family, dating back 200 years, written by the late Mrs. M. C. Bogart, Napanee, is just off the press. The book is well written with numerous illustrations, and does credit to its author. Arrangements are underway to fittingly celebrate this coming summer the one hundredth anniversary of the arrival of Moscow's first settlers.


