## FRONTENAC SCHOOL HALL

Formally Opened Thursday Evening—Dr. R. Bruce Taylor Gives Address.

The new assembly hall of Frontenac school, secured through the enterprise of the Frontenac public school Home and School Club, was opened on Thursday evening, and the event was the occasion for a very large gathering of parents and children, all of whom were delighted with the splendid hall, and the programme of addresses and music.

W. M. Campbell, chairman of the Board of Education, presided, and seated with him on the platform were Dr. Bruce Taylor, principal of Queen's university, Mrs. E. Godwin, trustee, H. F. Norman, trustee, Principal T. McKee, H. Hebert, trustee, Alderman W. Holder, and Mrs. S. A. Salisbury, president of the club. Addresses were given by Principal Taylor, Mrs. Godwin, Ald. Holder, Principal McKee, Trustees Hebert, Norman and Mrs. Salisbury, and a most entertaining musical programme was rendered. Those taking part were: Mrs. E. Treneer, J. Saunders, Miss Ruth LaFlair, songs; Miss Nellie Darren, Scotch dance. An orchestra composed of S. A. Salisbury, Mr. Whitney and Mr. Newlands played a number of selections.

Principal Taylor congratulated the parents, children and teachers upon having such a splendid assembly hall. He dealt in a most interesting way with the subject of education and emphasized the importance of cooperation between the school and the home. Parental influence was a great factor in determining the attitude of the children, and in developing that state of mental accuracy the school studies were designed to bring about. It was the part of parents to see that the home study period was used rightly by the child rather than to direct its study, for it was the child's own work that was most important. Referring to university work, he said those admitted had to work, for fees paid only represented one-third of the cost. Students were not wanted who could not or would not work well. It was a mistake to suppose that a university was an open door to money-making occupations, and none should expect to learn there how to make money. Rather should they have a passion for study. He mentioned one student from the Kingston schools, Ernest Gill, who excelled in the subject of mathematics.

Alderman Holder told of the work of the committee appointed to secure the hall. It was composed of Alderman H. Kelly, the late Alderman W. Patterson and himself. All of the credit, he said, was due to the Home and School Club.

The officers of the club are Mrs. S. A. Salisbury, president, and R. Baldwin, secretary.

### A FORMER KINGSTON.

Is Now Secretary to the Mayor of Toronto.

The Toronto Globe in "Have you met him?" sketch speaks thus of a former well known Kingstonian and prints:

"Almost a sphinx in relation to his own and the city's affairs is R. W. Clewio, secretary to his worship the mayor at the city hall. Wilson, secretary to then Mayor Hocken, became street commissioner, his worship found in the former fellow-newspaper worker the right man for the mayor's sanctum. It is hard for one outside the veil to realize what a 3rd degree Mason is, but for the benefit of the uninitiated it may be said that it is the peak of the craft, and R. W. Clewio is a Master of Ritual, and, in some respects, without a peer."

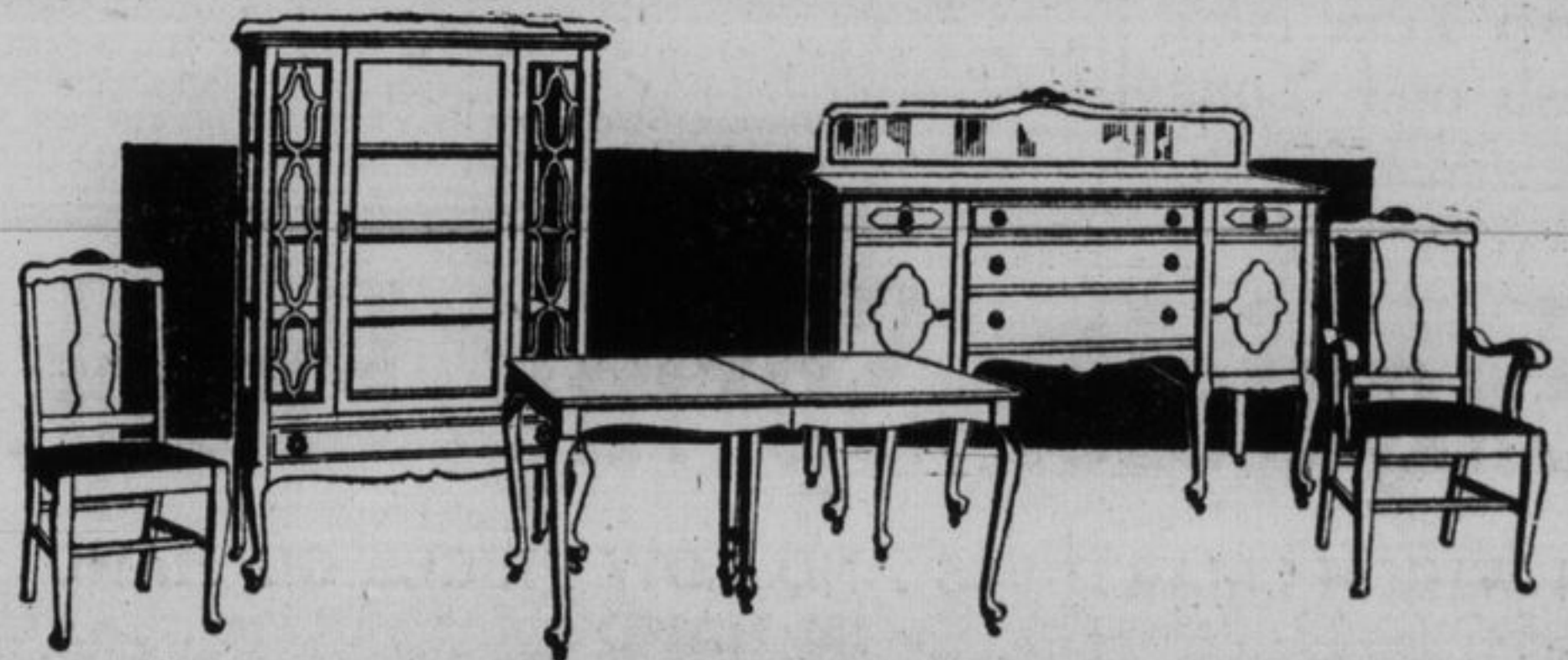
