Railway After Gravel
The C. P. R. has appropriated part of the land belonging to the Trenton Golf Club and will open up a gravel pit. Ballasting operations are to be started at once on the road bed between Trenton and Smith's Falls.

Manufacture in County
Owing to the number of canning factories in Prince Edward county (some twenty-seven in number) a committee of the Board of Trade was appointed to interview the Canadian canners with a view to having all cans, labels and box stuffs manufactured in the county.

To Give an Exhibition
George Dawson, 266 Nelson street, who invented a tile ditch-digger, has just returned from Ottawa where he had a very satisfactory interview with Hon. Mr. Motherwell, minister of agriculture. Mr. Dawson at an early date, will give an exhibition at the experimental farm at Ottawa.

Have Been Transferred

Farnsworth, Manitoba, to Montreal; T. A. Wimon, Alberta, to Montreal; are transfers just made by the Methodist Conference.

Insurance Rates Cut
The Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association has announced to its agents in Pembroke that a further cut in the premiums payable has been made. The reductions include ten cents on non-insurance rates, and eight cents on insurance rates, not, however, to apply to special hazard risks. On private dwellings a reduction of ten cents has been made.

Let Go Without a Trial
In the patriot war of 1838, Lorenzo Finney, Watertown, N.Y. was

wounded the first day. He was robbed of his coat and though his wounds had not been attended to for three and a half days, he was compelled to march through the mud and snow a distance of a mile and a half. He was later taken to the hospital at Kingston and was discharged in the spring, without trial and returned to Watertown, N.Y.

To Command Oil Burner
Capt. James Woods, a well-known Great Lakes navigator, of Ogdensburg, N.Y., has been appointed master of the steamer Fordonian, and will leave with his crew on April 22nd, for Quebec to take charge of the vessel which wintered at that port. She will trade this season between Montreal and Chicago. The Fordonian is an oil burner and was built four or five years ago.

Mrs. Fred Earl Dead
Mrs. Frederick Earl, a highly esteemed resident of Brockville, died suddenly on Wednesday at St. Vincent de Paul Hospital, after an illness of about a month, due to an accident she sustained when she fell while walking and fractured her left limb. The late Mrs. Earl was born in the township of Elizabethtown, a daughter of the late John and Sarah Westlake.

A Course in Training
Dr. Allen MacRossie, New York, formerly of Kingston, has charge of the conference course of study authorized by the Methodist general conference of the United States. The course of study formerly was merely a system of examinations. It has now been transformed into a real school—a course in training. The change has made it a real correspondence course, with written work culminating in examination at conference time.

Forty Years a Priest
At Hastings on April 16th, a reception was held in honor of Rev. C. S. Bretherton, who reached the fortieth year of his ministry. Ministers and public officials were present to congratulate Father Bretherton and express the hope that he would live to celebrate his golden jubilee. Hasting Chapter of the I. O. O. E. presented Father Bretherton with forty carnations and the horticultural society gave him a beautiful bouquet of roses.

Highly Educated Whites Operate
Rev. G. I. Campbell, formerly of Kingston, has been in Montreal on behalf of the Methodist Social service department investigating the drug vice. He says three lads and two girls of sixteen, pupils at a western high school, were recently found in possession of drugs and refused stoutly to say where they got them. He added: "As a matter of fact, much of our investigation shows that the bulk of the drug traffic is now undertaken by the Chinese as has long been reported; highly educated whites are in the midst of it, according to some things we have learned."

La' Mrs. John Logan, Renfrew
One of the most widely attended funerals held in Renfrew district for years took place on Sunday at Renfrew, when Mrs. John Logan was buried. Mrs. Logan had lived most of her life in Renfrew, and was widely known. She was in her sixty-first year, and had been ill for seven weeks when she died.

Taking the Roof of Canada.

“AND just then,” said Otto Paul Schwarz, of Switzerland, in describing a trip in the Canadian Pacific Rockies, “we saw a huge Bergschrund.”
“And did it bark at you?” he was asked. “Or do they bleed?”
“Ach, no. A bergschrund is not a bird. It is a huge crevasse where the ice has slipped down the rock wall and cracked. The next stumbling block we came to was a chimney. This is a hard business. It means bracing your back against one wall and your feet against the other and doing what you call on this side the shimmy till you get to the top. Iceicles fifteen feet long hung above us.”
It is a great life, this one of mountain climbing, especially higher up where the glaciers are. Imagine a river of ice with a depth of something like 1,000 feet. Great crevasses reach down. It seems to the bowels of the earth, peaks and minarets rise from its uneven surface and glisten in the sun which can never warm them; a giant green-white force, irresistible, stupendous, with an alluring fascination which the lovers of the outdoors cannot deny.
The picture above was taken on the “roof of Canada” near Banff, and the huge glacier which to make it traversing will, in years, perhaps, help rate of about four inches each day, nothing will hold it, but another generation of sightseers will have come and gone before the ice on which the climbers stand will have found its way down to the warmer valleys where it will melt; and in the meantime, snow from the even higher peaks will press and pack and so, so far as the present day world is concerned, the life of this wonderful natural force is without end.
