ST. GEORGE'S CATHEDRAL

The 139th Anniversary Was Fittingly Observed at the Sunday Services.

Sunday, the eve of St. George's Day, and the one hundred and thirty-ninth anniversary of the parish of St. George's, was marked in St. George's cathedral by special sermons and music. The anthem "Praise the Lord," was sung at both choral services and in the morning the hymns, "O God Our Help in Ages Past," "Fight the Good Fight," and the "Alleluia Requiem" were heartily sung. The congregation included the cadets from the Royal Military College and the men of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery who paraded with their band to assist in celebrating the anniversary of the founding of the parish, which has included the garrison among its members since the first service was held in the Tete du Pont barracks in 1783, by Rev. John Stuart, who had come from the older colony to the south with the United Empire Loyalists.

The Dean of Ontario was the preacher, and spoke of the virtue of courage and the appeal made to men of English blood by the legendary story of St. George and the dragon. The valor of the Knight had caught their imagination and their battle cry was "For St. George and merry England." The same spirit of undaunted courage was in the hearts of the little band of United Empire Loyalists, who had, with loyalty to God and their King, left their lands to come to Cataragui to make a home for themselves in the Canadian forest.

The first St. George's, built by the U. E. Loyalists, was completed in 1791; the building has occupied its present site since 1825. In 1890 it was enlarged to its present proportions under the late Buxton B. Smith, D.D., then dean and rector, to whose courage and optimism the congregation owe the beautiful cathedral partially destroyed on January 1st 1899, and again restored by Dean Smith.

Held Impromptu Dance.
On Saturday night, after the conclusion of the K.C.I. exhibition in the Grand Opera House, a number of the collegiate boys and girls held an impromptu dance on the stage, through the courtesy of Manager D. P. Branigan. Three cheers were given for Mr. Branigan—before the young people took possession of the house for an hour's amusement.

Outfitting C.S.L. Vessels.
The local staff of the Canada Steamship Lines expect to move into their summer office on Swift's wharf this week. They are busily engaged just now in outfitting vessels at the old M. T. wharves. Superintendent Dick is in charge of this important work. The members of the various crews expect to be ready for the season's work this week.

The steamer Malton, which has been undergoing repairs at the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company's drydock, will be floated late Monday afternoon and will be taken below the La Salle causeway until commissioned again for lake service.
