Bureau Covers? The "latest thing" in bureau cov-The Liberals have decided to con- ers is quite a departure from the long scarf or the oblong cover which

comes to the edge of the bureautop. This new style cover is made in three pieces:

How to Make a Three-Piece Dresser Set: The average bureau is about a yard long, perhaps an inch or so longer. For this size bureau-top you will need a yard and an eighth of goods for the cover. Most bureaus of this size are about seventeen inches deep. Therefore the three pieces of the cover-set will consist of two 10-by-4-inch pieces (one for either end) and a middle piece measuring fourteen inches square. This does not allow for the hem; these measurements are for the three dollies when they are finished.

You will agree with me that this type of bureau cover is most effective when you have finished it and put it on the dresser or dressing table. Each peice should be finished either with a narrow edging of some sort (perhaps a simple picot or narrow lace), or many have a hem not quite an inch deep. Hemstitched edges are also pretty. The three pieces are placed on the bureau-top one inch apart.

Now, in regard to materials for making these three-piece sets: The most effective set I have so far seen at the edges, and having a crossstitch design in each corner done in was a black basket (with high handle) filled with flowers of various delicate colors.
