THE CHRISTIAN

Maurice Tourneur's Mammoth Production at the Allen Today.

Few novelists of this generation have been more popular in English speaking countries than Sir Hall Caine, author of the novel, "The Christian," which Maurice Tourneur has produced as a motion picture for Goldwyn Pictures Corporation and which will be the attraction for four days at the Allen Theatre, beginning today. "The Christian," swept England and her colonies and the United States by storm a quarter of a century ago when it was first published.

It was dramatised and produced with Edward Morgan and Viola Allen as the John Storm and Glory Quayle, scoring a great success.
