DUKE'S WEDDING CHIMES ACTED AS DINNER BELL

For Thousands of Children Who Were Guests at Wedding Parties.

London, April 26.—The Duke of York's wedding chimes today were a dinner bell for thousands of children, who not only got a holiday on the occasion of the wedding, but were the guests of the various municipalities at "Wedding Parties." In the city of London 8,000 children attended a party given by the Duke of York, at which a four-foot wedding cake was cut up for them. This also applies to all the larger cities in Great Britain.

The Duke is referred to by many of the papers as "His Royal Highness, the Bridegroom." He elected to appear attired in the uniform of the Royal Air Force at the wedding although he has been an officer of the navy for a longer period.

Among the infinite variety of treasures showered upon the Duke of York and his duchess none has excited more popular interest than those of the Prince of Wales, which includes a palatial automobile, a pair of gold candlesticks, a superb gold cigarette case, a sable coat and a diamond bracelet. The coat is made from specially selected furs from Canada.

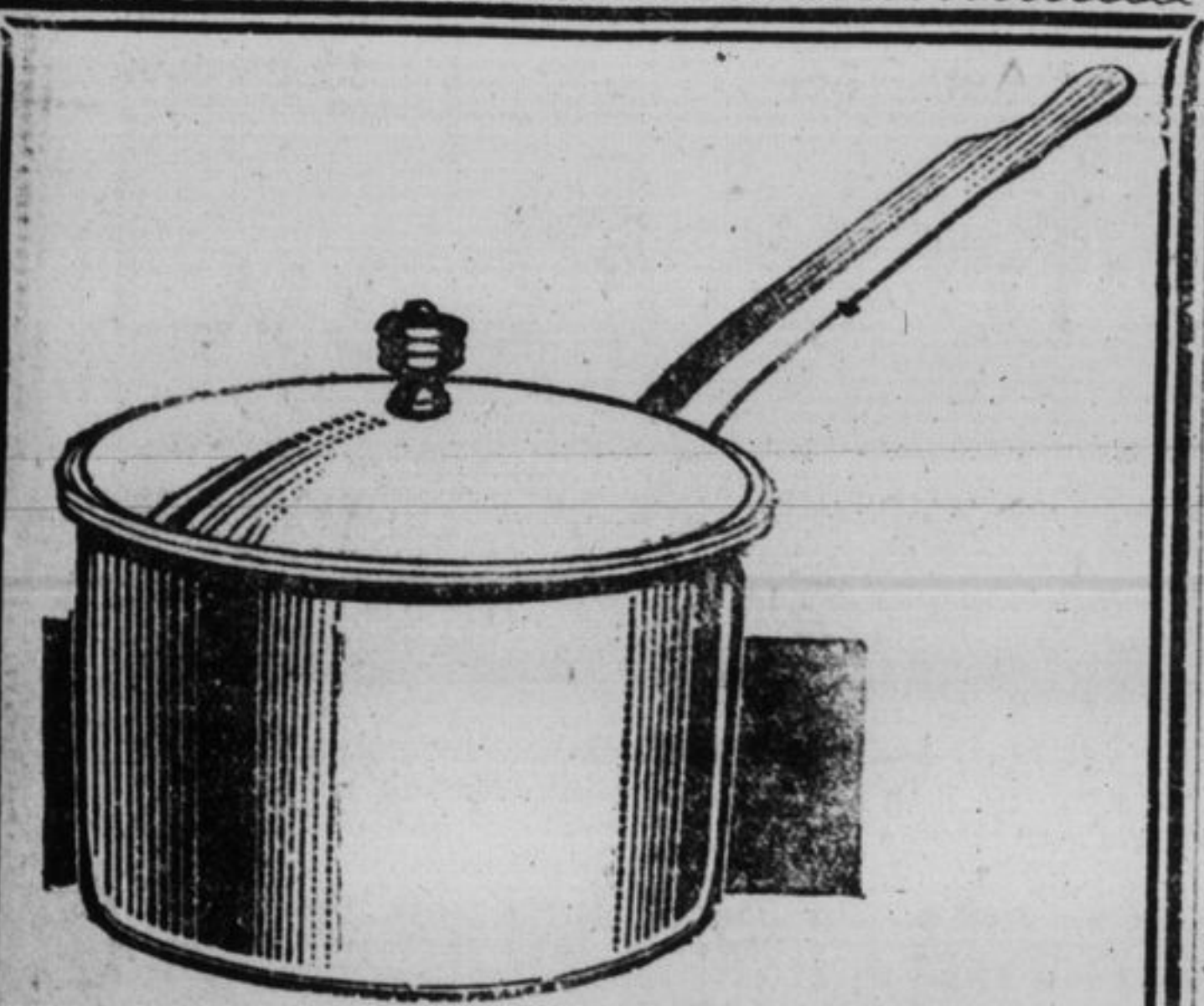
